FAST SAILING.—The barque "Lent A Martinez," from Pictou, arrived at Queens-town in the short space of 12 days.

DROWNED.—James Durkee, of the schr. "Benkillam," was drowned off Patridge Island on Saturday evening, by the jibing of the jibboom of the schooner. Terence Keenan, of Yarmouth, N. S., mate of the barque "Nellie Crosby," was drowned in Charleston harbor on Friday last.

A LARGE SHIPMENT.—Steamship Prince Edward, with cargo consisting of 73,500 bushels of oats, 37 boxes of potatoes, 279 pieces of deals and ends, containing 9000 s.p. feet, 1 barrel buffalo robes, 1 box surgical instruments, 1 case Indian goods, and 53 bags of cracked oats and barley, shipped by Peake Bros. & Co., sailed for Queens-town, G. B., on the 5th inst., calling at Pictou to take in her bunker coal. We believe that this is the largest shipment of oats that has ever left this Island in one vessel.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—The Antigonish Cas- ket reports the death of Mr. D. R. McInnes, of Ohio, in that county. About a year and a half ago he was nearly crushed to death by falling into a pit at Goldenville, but under skillful medical treatment recovered in a considerable degree the use of his limbs. Two weeks ago, on his return from a neighbour's house on horseback, the horse took fright, threw him, and again shattered his limbs. After a few days of suffering the poor man expired.

A TERRIBLE AFFAIR—A Northampton, Mass., despatch to the Bangor Commercial of Friday evening, gives the following particulars of a terrible affray that occurred at the former place on Thursday night last:—

"Matthew Davenport, an Englishman, aged 50, advertised to pay no debts of his wife's contracting because she had left him. They had frequent quarrels over the custody of the children. She had left him for the third time about a month ago, and has since been living with an American named Pratt, about 55 years old, who is a sort of preaching hypocrite and recently come here. Last night Davenport concealed himself in the cellar of the house where Pratt and her paramour lived, and at half-past five yesterday morning Mrs. Davenport went down cellar for wood to light the fire, when Davenport sprung upon her, pounded her head with a ball club and then stabbed her in the right breast with a butcher knife. Her cries aroused Pratt who rushed down stairs and grappled with Davenport. The two fought some time, when Pratt received a six inch cut across the abdomen which let his intestines out. The neighbors hearing the cries rushed in and separated the two men. Pratt cannot live long, and the woman's life is doubtful. Davenport was arrested and says he doesn't care to live and regrets he hadn't killed them both outright.

RUSSIA AGAIN DEFEATED.

AUSTRIA PREPARING FOR ACTION.

Another Conservative Triumph

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Dec. 5.

Gold 102½. Exchange 81½ to 84½. The Russians have been defeated near Timova, with a loss of 3,000.

Prince Milan reviewed the Servian militia on Saturday, and exhorted them to do their duty.

General Gourka has promised to send 8,000 cavalry to General Harvatovitch. Suleiman Pasha is endeavoring to cut the Russian communication in the north slope of the Balkans.

The Pope is slightly better. The estimates for the Austrian army have been increased 2,000,000 florins for ordinary expenditure, and 4,000,000 florins for extraordinary expenditure.

The North German "Gazette" says that if England does not intervene, peace will be brought about by an alliance of the Emperors.

ANTIGONISH, Dec. 5. Mr. Thompson has been elected to the Nova Scotian House for the County of Antigonish by a majority of 500.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

PORT OF CHARLOTTETOWN.

Laura D., Patton, Liverpool, 15,000 bushels oats, 260 pieces deals. S. S. Prince Edward, Fraser, Queens-town, for orders, produce. Sch. S. P. Lindsay, Johnston, Boston, 3,600 bushels potatoes, Dean Bros.

The barque Midas, from Liverpool for this port, was spoken on the 16th ult., at 50 deg. N., long. 2,056 West.

Sailed from Aberdeen, on the 15th ult., the barque Lizzie Cameron, Cameron, for this Island.

LOSS OF A VESSEL WITH FIFTY PERSONS ON BOARD.—A schooner called The Rose, of Carbonear, Newfoundland, Captain Kinnealy, with over fifty souls on board, men, women and children, left Cape Charles, Labrador, on her return voyage, on October 15th, for Carbonear, and has not since been heard of. There is no longer a shadow of hope regarding the ill-fated vessel, which must have foundered at sea in one of the heavy gales which prevailed at the time. She was in ballast, and but ill-prepared to encounter rough weather. The apprehensions regarding her are confirmed by reports, from two vessels lately arrived, stating that they had passed a vessel about her size on her beam ends, with both masts unshipped. The passengers were fishermen, many of them with their wives and children on board, who had spent the summer fishing on Labrador, and with their hard-earned earnings were returning to their homes. This terrible disaster leaves a wide circle of mourners in Carbonear.

SHIPPING NOTES.—There is yet something doing in coal shipments, the weeks total being quite large for the season. Among the coal cargoes cleared during the week are the S. S. Acadian, to Halifax, with 1200 tons from the Vale Co., and the barque Anity with 801 tons from the Hx. Co., to Cardenas. A number of cargoes went by sailing vessels to adjacent ports, and to Halifax. Quite a number of small craft arrived during the week. The schr. Aucilla brought goods ex S. S. Prince Edward, and the schr. Hariza, goods from Boston via Halifax. In repairing little is doing. The Anity has been thoroughly repaired, and sailed as above. The Mabel will soon be ready for sea, and is now reloading. The Agra will probably need extensive repairs.—Pictou Standard.

THE S.S. "Newfield," here for coal, and mining specimens for the Paris Exhibition, sailed on Saturday. All the Pictou County Companies sent specimens of their coal, cut in a manner allowing them to be arranged in the form of a pyramid, that being the plan adopted for the display of Nova Scotia coal at the Paris Exhibition of 1876 by the Commissioners. The specimens put on board of the "Newfield" are said to have been of much excellence.—Pictou Standard.

Local and Other Items.

THE steamer "M. A. Starr" sailed for Halifax this afternoon with a cargo of produce. She will very likely make another trip to this port.

FOUR of the crew of the brig, Maggie, of and for this port from Portsmouth, were landed at Liverpool on the 17th ult. by the steamer Russia. The Maggie was previously reported abandoned. The crew will be sent to Portsmouth.

INSOLVENT RELIEF.—An application for insolvent relief was this morning made by Edward McEntee, before the Stipendiary Magistrate. Mr. John McEachern, dry goods merchant, Queen's Street, was plaintiff in the matter. It appears that in April last, the applicant obtained a suit of clothing from Mr. McEachern. At that time he had arrived in the Brig, Lady Milton, and promised to pay for the clothing when he would receive his wages. This he did not do, and McEachern obtained judgment against him in the matter and he is now undergoing imprisonment for the debt. The application was refused on account of proof having been given of McEntee's obtaining his wages at the time, and of his unwillingness to pay the plaintiff, notwithstanding his having means to do so several times since the goods were obtained.
