

Claimer Tonight In Summerside

Tonight at Summerside raceway the key feature event in the claiming race for a purse of \$1000.00. Nine horses with claiming tags from \$800 to \$1500 will compete for their present owners — word around is some of them will be claimed but horse men are a cagey lot and most are non-committal as to their plans.

A great number of rules cover a claiming race and the most important are — an owner can train or a claimed horse cannot be the trainer of the horse for the new owner.

The claim box closes 15 minutes before post time and once the horse starts, the claimant is his new owner at the end of the race — whether it be alive or dead or sound or unsound, or injured during the race or after it.

If more than one claimer is filing for the same horse, the owner shall be determined by lot of the judges.

All claims must be made with a certified check for the amount of the claiming price.

All monies earned by the horse in the race shall go to the original owner.

Nine top pacers go in the rich claiming race which goes in dashes 3 and 7. Favorites are Ripover, Chet Lynn Roy, Stalag Hanover, and Dreamy Guy. Other starters are: Spensive Spud, Little Bob E, Belle Texas, Miley Hal, and Tennessee Riley.

The first class goes in dashes 5 and 8 with eight top pacers looking for top money. Any of the eight is capable of walking off with top money and the betting fraternity will have a tough time picking a winner in this class. Meadow Day leaves on the rail, Mountain Marie scores two, Timmy H. will leave from the three spot, Annan Gal starts from the four spot, Potomac Church will leave five, Paddyland Girl has drawn the outside position, White Choice will trail out Meadow Day, and the good pacing mare Slippy Queen will trail out Mountain Marie.

The ninth dash is the exactor race and with eight equal starters, it's anybody's race.

All adds up to an evening of top notch entertainment with post time at 8 p.m.

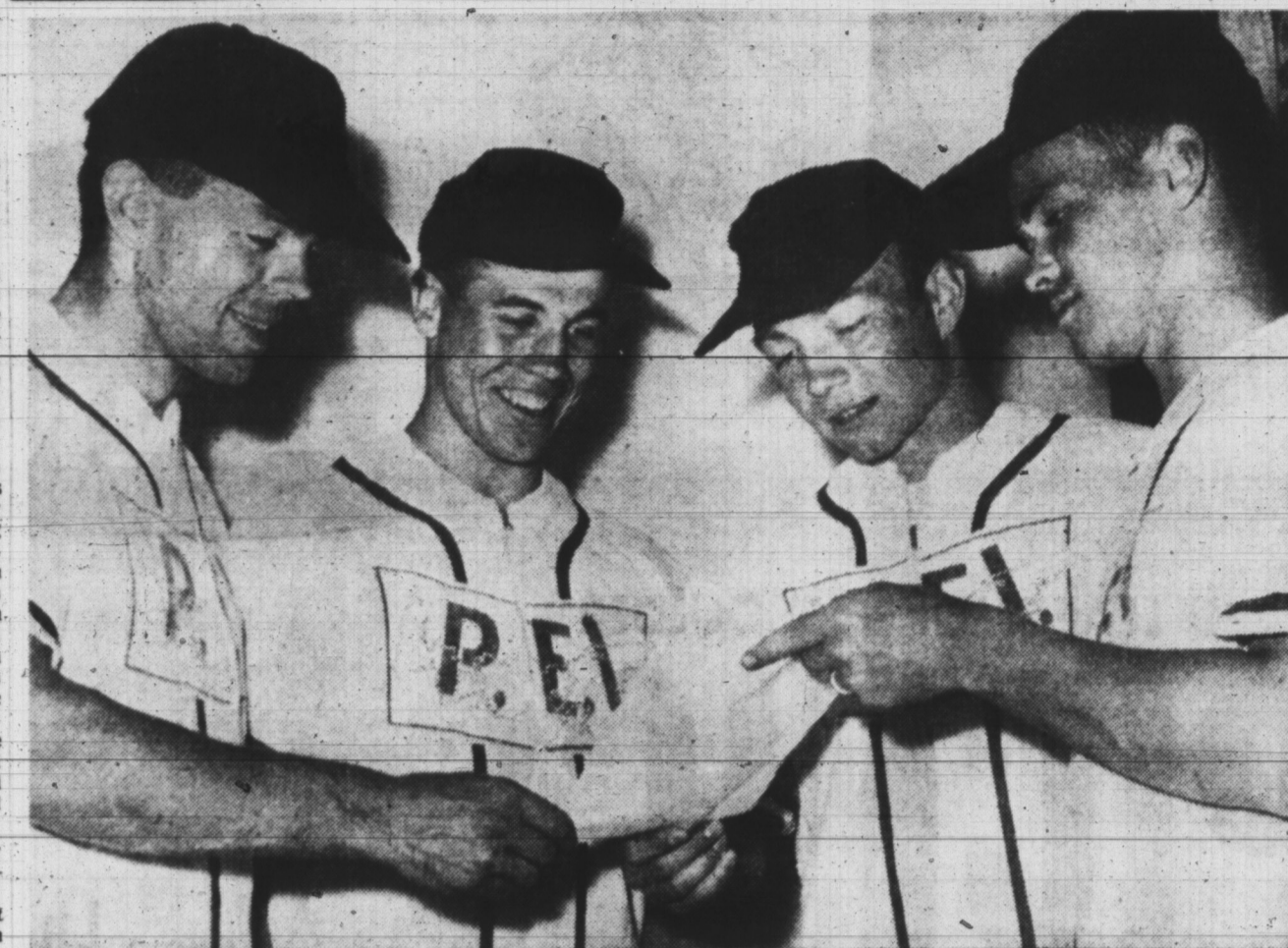

One Player On Each Club Named To All-Star Team

NEW YORK (AP)—No more than one player from any team was named Tuesday to the starting infields for the All-Star baseball game in St. Louis, July 12. But an injury to third baseman Ron Santo of Chicago Cubs may result in two San Francisco infielders playing for the National League.

Santo was selected for the NL along with first baseman Willie McCovey of San Francisco, second baseman Joe Morgan of Houston and shortstop Leo Cardenas of Cincinnati.

The American League will open with rookie first baseman George Scott of Boston, second baseman Bobby Knop of California, shortstop Dick McAuliffe of Detroit and third baseman Brooks Robinson of Baltimore.

Santo edged Jim Ray Hart of the Giants, 151 votes to 125. However, the Cubs' star suffered a fractured cheekbone when hit by a pitched ball in Sunday's game against New York Mets and underwent surgery Monday.

Morgan is another doubtful starter. He suffered a broken knee cap last Saturday. Closest to the Astros' second baseman in the voting was Jim Lefebvre of Los Angeles.

SUBSTITUTES LIKELY

Presumably, substitution will be made if Santo and Morgan are unable to play. NL manager Walt Alton of Los Angeles will have to ask Sam Rice of Minnesota if the AL manager.

The Orioles' Robinson was the leading vote getter on both starting infields, collecting 257. He and McAuliffe were the only repeaters from last year's starters.

Charlottetown Ball Loop Is Heading For Success

Those three smiling gentlemen above represent one of the most ambitious steps taken in minor league baseball on the Island for a number of reasons. They are the coaches of the four teams in the newly formed city minor league loop and between the four of them is the story of baseball of Charlottetown for the past few seasons. So one might say that they represent the old and the new.

In 1962 the Royal Canadian Legion went into the baseball business in a big way and at that time formed the nucleus of a team that was to have one of the best records of any team in the Maritimes, both then and now. Under the coaching of Charlie Ryan the Midget club, at that time, swept through the Maritime playoffs without a loss and although people did not know it then, they were to repeat that dazzling performance for another two straight years while they were on their way to two consecutive Maritime juvenile Titles.

Last year however the Legion team lost its first game ever in Maritime playdowns and with the series with the Nova Scotia champions tied at one game apiece the two clubs were forced to call off the series. Murrings were heard in the background that the lack of competition was a factor in the showing and this eventually proved to be one of the reasons for the formation of the junior loop.

After a long series of meetings the Canadian Legion and the City of Charlottetown Recreation department announced that there would be a league composed of Midget Juvenile and Junior players in the city and plans have been going ahead at full steam since that time. Approximately 75 players have turned out for the four teams and there have been practices every evening for the respective clubs.

The whole concept of the league shows promise for the future. If this is possible considering the success that players from Charlottetown have had in the past both on the Maritime and National scene. Many fans will find the thrilling showing that the provincial team put up last season when it went to Winnipeg and one must consider anywhere near a full schedule.

No less than four Charlottetown players were named to the Canadian All-Star team last summer and fittingly enough two of them, Billy Weatherbie and Barry Ellis have been named as coaches. Another Canadian All-Star Freddie MacDonald will be playing in the loop and the final one, Mike Kelly is playing semi-pro baseball in the U.S.

It just goes to show that this local junior loop will have a high caliber of play and if the number of fans attending the practices are any indication of the number which will attend the games the loop is slated to be a success from the first game.

Champ Cassius Clay Defending Title Twice

NEW YORK (AP)—Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay is virtually set to meet Britain's Brian London in London, England, Aug. 6 and West Germany's Karl Mildenberger in Frankfurt, Germany, Sept. 10 or 17.

LONDON, British promoter Jack Solomons said only one or two little things still had to be ironed out before Clay and 32-year-old London sign contracts for July 30, Aug. 6 or Aug. 13 in London, Blackpool or Manchester.

Solomons' representative Lawrie Lewis was meeting in New York with Arthur Gratton, attorney for Clay's Louisville sponsoring group.

Gratton confirmed that the London fight was close to being made.

"There are a number of points still under discussion," said Gratton. "It may take a day or two to iron them out. But I'll say Solomons is within range on terms and dates."

From another source here, it was learned that the likely date and site for the Clay-London fight was Aug. 6 at London's Wembley indoor stadium, which seats about 12,000.

If successful against London, Clay then would take on Mildenberger, the European champion, at Frankfurt, Sept. 10 or 17.

Both fights would be telecast to the United States and other parts of the world just as was done for Clay's defence against Britain's Henry Cooper at London, May 21. Clay stopped Cooper in the sixth round.

Clay would receive \$250,000 plus a big percentage of the television and other ancillary rights for the London fight, and possibly more for the Mildenberger fight.

London is reported bitter over Clay's description of him. Clay called him "too old, too short, too fat and too ugly."

SUBJECT TO CALLUP

Clay still is subject to a military callup under the IA draft classification which he is appealing.

London has bounced up and down in the fight game like a yo-yo. He was knocked out by Floyd Patterson, then the heavyweight champion, in the 11th round at Indianapolis on May 1, 1959.

A pro since 1955 and a former British champion, London lost to Henry Cooper in 15 rounds for the British and European heavyweight titles Feb. 24, 1964.

A 196-pounder, he has a 35-13 won-lost record, including 26 knockouts. He has been stopped five times.

TRURO (CP)—Two horses set personal records during an eight-dash harness racing program Tuesday.

West River Boy won a mile in 2:09.45 for a maiden mark and West River April won in 2:08.25.

Other winners were Crazy Legs (2:15), Leland Bell (2:16), J. Scotch Hal (2:08.35), Adios Skyther (2:12.45), Miss Jo Ann Adios (2:09.45) and Tyson Rip (2:14.15).

MONCTON (CP)—Six horses, including last year's winner, have been entered in the second annual Maritime pacing derby, scheduled for Brunswick Downs here Friday.

The race, offering a purse of \$1,250, is restricted to Maritime-bred horses and is the only one of its type in the Maritime Provinces.

J. Scotch Hal, winner of the 1965 Derby, drew the post position for Friday's race. J. Scotch Hal is owned by Gordon McKinnon of Charlottetown.

Other horses entered are: Donna Way, owned by Charles Willis of P.E.I.; Miss Betty M., owned by Frank Stanfield of Truro; Starburn, owned by Mrs. Elsa Williamson of Fredericton; Nancy's Pick, owned by Hogg and Wright of Moncton; and West River April, owned by the West River Stock Farm of Antigonish, N.S.

The others were outfielders Mike Eppler and Roger Stevens. Eppler, 20, a right-handed hitter, finished his sophomore year at Tulsa University. Stevens, 20, a left-handed hitter, completed his third year at the University of California and is from Pasadena, Calif.
