(Continued from page 1) sources. KEY FACTOR Traffic problems were the key factor in urban renewal. Growth was bringing heavy demands for more school and hospital facilities.

But the "restrictive and inflexible nature" of real estate taxes—the main source of municipal revenue—prevented municipalities from doing the job on their own. Municipal governments are operating in a financial strait jacket that gives them little or no room to take on added obligations. But Mr. Diefenbaker, in a preceding speech, viewed the matter in a different light. Although municipalities claim the real estate tax burden is too heavy, he said, on the average real estate taxes now are only about four per cent of personal incomes compared with 5.8 per cent immediately before the Second World War. Municipalities have on the average achieved a relative reduction in the effective burden of real estate taxes. The prime minister went on to point to increasing federal activities in social security and housing as having freed local governments of a big share of costs they would otherwise bear.

# CCF Wants Militia Trained To Aid Civilians In Nuclear Raid

By FORBES RHUDE Canadian Press Business Editor MONTREAL (CP)—Canadian armed forces, other than those expected to be used in an immediate operational role, should be trained to assist the civilian population to survive a nuclear attack, the policy committee of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce said Monday.

The suggestion—contained in the committee's recommendation on defence—was one of scores of matters considered, as the big committee waded through more than 100 pages of policy statements and resolutions. The committee proper consists of 50 members, chosen to give representation to all parts of the country, but all delegates may join in the discussions.

SUBJECT TO APPROVAL Monday's decisions are subject to approval at a plenary session

Wednesday. Expanding on the role of armed forces in civil defence the committee said: "The reserve forces and particularly the militia could be of great assistance in this vital task were the necessary reorganization and training carried out."

In the discussion, C. M. Drury of Montreal, former deputy minister for defence, said that in a war of survival Western countries would use thermo-nuclear weapons. Procedure of the past—under which a force was trained for overseas operation—would be out of the question. A great many members of the militia, he added, realize that any role for them as a field force is "not realistic."

REJECT LOTTERIES The committee turned down a recommendation which, while

generally disapproving of lotteries would have favored widening of present practice in various fields such as charitable, religious and community purposes. After consideration of many amendments and sub-amendments it seemed to be finally felt that the matter was not one on which the chamber need make a recommendation.

A key to the proposal was given by Gilbert Garnett of Vancouver when he said—amid applause—that he didn't want to tell the boys and girls of Vancouver that Canada's "parliament of business" favored the "extension of gambling."

CONSERVATION CONTROL The committee approved a Calgary resolution which recommended that all regulation required at the national government level to control the conservation, development and utilization of energy resources "can and should be administered by existing agencies, suggested where deemed necessary."

In the trade section of the resolutions, Western chambers were successful in knocking out a number of references which they felt might infer that the chamber favored a high tariff policy.

## Asks Promises, Performances Be Compared

WINNIPEG (CP)—Liberal Leader Lester Pearson said Monday comparison of the promises and performance of the Progressive Conservatives will help take some of the "bloom" off the government in Western Canada.

Mr. Pearson, on a tour of the west, said in a press conference: "If farmers compare what the prime minister and his colleagues used to say in the House of Commons about agricultural problems with what they did in the last session that will help remove some of that bloom."

their support of parity in farm prices and had introduced a \$1-an-acre payment to farmers "based on no particular principle or policy." The expectations of western farmers had been "falsified." Mr. Pearson described amendments to the Customs Act passed at the last session of Parliament which provide anti-dumping regulations and higher tariffs on wool, as restrictive legislation of the worst kind. Asked about protests by Manitoba and Saskatchewan against tolls on the St. Lawrence Seaway, Mr. Pearson said the Liberals feel such tolls should be reasonable in character and at the lowest possible level.

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## Wave Of Violence Mounts In Cyprus, NATO Concerned

NICOSIA (Reuters)—A wave of bloody violence mounted on Cyprus Monday as Britons buried a soldier's wife slain by terrorists last Friday.

Four British soldiers were injured, one severely, when terrorists blew up an army vehicle with electrically-detonated mines near Taadha, in western Cyprus.

A Greek-Cypriot was killed by British gunfire at Lefkonika in eastern Cyprus after a bomb exploded near a troop truck. Another Greek-Cypriot, a night watchman near Lakatamia village, was shot to death by masked gunmen.

Against the background of increased tension, funeral services for Mrs. Catherine Culliffe, mother of five children, were held under close guard here. SHE WAS SHOOTING Mrs. Culliffe was shot in Famagusta while shopping with her 13-year-old daughter. Another serviceman's wife, Mrs. Elfrida Robinson, was severely injured in the attack. On the Greek-Cypriot side, there was bitterness against the security forces over the injuries to about 250 Greeks in Famagusta during mass arrests which followed the shooting.

Meanwhile, in Paris, the 15-nation NATO permanent council held a crucial session on the Cyprus issue.

NATO Secretary-General Paul-Henri Spaak has proposed that representatives from Britain, Greece, Turkey and of Greek and Turkish Cypriots attend talks on the political future of the island.

NATO quarters, however, expressed concern over the renewed violence on the island at a time when negotiations were under way.

## Wife Of Veteran VC Winner Dies

QUEBEC (CP)—Lady Harriet Turner, 85, wife of Lt.-Gen. Sir Richard Turner, VC, died Monday.

Beside Sir Richard, survivors include a son, Maj. H. R. Turner of Winnipeg, and two daughters, Mrs. J. Gagnon Ross of Quebec City and Mrs. Gordon D. Campbell of Montreal. Funeral will be held Wednesday.

## Big Schedule Face The Allan Cup Champions

BELLEVILLE, Ont. (CP)—The Allan Cup champion Belleville McFarlands have scheduled 60 exhibition and league games this season to prepare for the world hockey tournament in Prague next February.

"The Macs are going to get a maximum of hockey and a minimum of travel," reports coach Drury Deynes. "Instead of interlocking with other leagues, we will play out a full schedule with our own circuit in eastern Ontario. The players will be in shape by the time we leave Canada."

The Allan Cup champs will leave Toronto on Feb. 1 for an overseas tour against teams in Scotland, England, Norway, Finland, Germany, Italy and Switzerland—22 games in all—before returning to the world tournament. Four "special" games are slated with Czechoslovakia after the tournament. When Belleville takes to the ice they will be sporting new sweaters as a result of complaints made by European clubs last year. The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has requested that "Canada" be worn on the front of the jerseys instead of the back as were Whittby's in Oslo.

## Tigers, Tribe Swap Players

NEW YORK (AP)—The Daily Mirror says it has learned infielder Billy Martin of Detroit has been traded to Cleveland for righthanded pitcher Ray Narleski.

In its Tuesday edition, the Mirror said although no announcement has come from the clubs, the swap has been completed.

Martin, 30, played for New York Yankees, and Kansas City before being traded to Detroit. Narleski, long sought by the Yankees, has been with Cleveland since 1954. The 29-year-old hurler has been used mainly in relief.

## Study Use Of New Lights For Crosswalks

TORONTO (CP)—Metropolitan Toronto roads and traffic committee Monday asked its technical committee to study the use of some type of overhead light for pedestrian crosswalks.

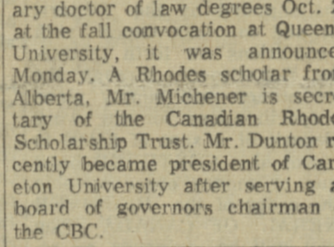
Sam Cass, Metro traffic engineer, was told to give special consideration to an amber light with the word "crosswalk" in red underneath. It was suggested the light be suspended over the centre of each crosswalk.

The city's 200 new crosswalks, introduced Sept. 15, were daubed with huge white Xs during the weekend in an effort to ensure greater safety for pedestrians.

Three persons have been killed in accidents at the newly-marked crosswalks during the last three weeks. But Deputy Police Chief Robert Kerr told the committee that during the period the crosswalk system has been in effect, there have been 46 less accidents involving pedestrians than in a similar period last year.

## Gifts To Art Gallery Come Off Tax Bill

FREDERICTON (CP)—Gifts to the Lord Beaverbrook Art Gallery—in the form either of money contributions or paintings and other works of art—will be deductible for income tax purposes. A ruling to this effect has been made by the Federal Department of National Revenue, Lord Beaverbrook, who is giving the new cultural institution to the people of New Brunswick, said of the announcement from Ottawa: "this will mean much to the future of the gallery."

The imposing building of glazed-brick and white limestone, on a central landscaped site here overlooking the St. John River, is approaching completion. It will display about 300 outstanding British and Canadian paintings of the 18th to 20th centuries, including a number of the works of old masters. Beaverbrook has assembled from many parts of Europe and North America during the last decade.

The ruling concerning additional gifts to the Art Gallery was made in a letter from Hon. George C. Nowlan, Minister of National Revenue, to Hon. A. J. Brooks, Minister of Veterans' Affairs and New Brunswick representative in the Federal Cabinet, who made application for the tax concession on behalf of the trustees of the Art Gallery.

## Name Justices For Ont. Court

OTTAWA (CP)—Justice Minister Fulton Monday announced appointment of two new justices to Ontario's Supreme Court. They are Toronto lawyers Stanley N. Schatz, 69, and George T. Walsh, 67, and will fill the two additional positions in the court created by the Ontario legislature some months ago.

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
