Dear Mary Haworth: As a student in a church-supported college, I have noted with interest the debate in your column pertaining to social discipline at such schools. I must say that I disagree with many of the views expressed.

A college is an institution dedicated to the transmission of higher learning. A church-related college puts this effort in its proper light: with God as its inspiration and its goal.

College is a society of adults, not a baby-sitter substitute. Admission to college presupposes that the student is a morally responsible person.

It is well nigh impossible for a college to police the student day and night to insure his conduct to a moral code that should have been instilled in him from childhood by his parents.

Anyone who lacks this moral code will find ways and means of circumventing the most precautionary rules and regulations. Thus when it comes to the attention of a college that a student lacks moral responsibility, it is their business to print a pattern.

I saw many tragic cases of inactivity, rebellion and involvement in serious infractions of military discipline, which had been pushed into the Army by well-meaning relatives.

The end of February totalled 12,347,000 pounds, compared with 13,072,000 in the corresponding period of 1962, a decline of 11,658,000 last year.
