Island Odds And Ends

If Willard Kelly's retirement from horse-racing is permanent then the sport in this part of Canada has had quite a setback. The word sport is used advisedly, because the man who brought the great sire Kalmuck to this Province, was pre-eminently a clean and modest competitor over a long span of years. There are good drivers in the Province, good trainers, good breeders, sportsmanlike owners, but Willard Kelly was all four, a great horse-racing personality in all branches of the game.

Perhaps as much as any sire ever brought here, his stud Kalmuck influenced the history of racing in this and adjoining provinces, and through his get, established a dynasty noted for fast, tough track performers.

Island racing is losing not just another great figure but one of its mainstays, a man whose contribution to track lore will long live in the annals of racing.

Woman Given Two-Year Term At Georgetown
