The many friends and relatives were saddened to learn of the passing at the family residence in Whitby, Ont., on August 17, of John A. Cunningham.

The deceased was born in Kinkora, P. E. I. 62 years ago. For a number of years he resided in Morell, P. E. I. and eight years ago he moved to New Glasgow, N. S. where he was employed by the Eastern Car Company, Trenton.

U.S. To Build Major Atomic Power Plant

By WILLIAM J. CONWAY CHICAGO, (AP) — The United States announced Thursday it will build a major atomic power plant — turning war's most destructive force to the constructive uses of peace.

The announcement was made by Thomas E. Murray, a member of the Atomic Energy Commission. It is the first full-scale American attempt to harness atomic energy for peaceful work.

Murray termed the move "America's answer to recent Soviet atomic weapons tests." He also spoke of how the use of atomic energy in generating electric power will exert a powerful influence in the cold war and the competition for vital uranium.

60,000 Kilowatts Murray, in a speech on the Electric Companies Public Information Program, disclosed these details: The AEC will build an industrial power reactor producing at least 60,000 kilowatts of electrical energy. That's enough for a city of 50,000 population.

Cost: "many tens of millions of dollars." Time: hopes are geared to having an operating plant in three or four years. Place: the project may be located "at or near" an AEC facility for separating uranium-235, the fissionable material in the A-bomb, from natural uranium.

The AEC has one such facility at Oak Ridge, Tenn. It's building others at Paducah, Ky., and Portsmouth, Ohio.
