Mrs. Mark Cameron Organist.

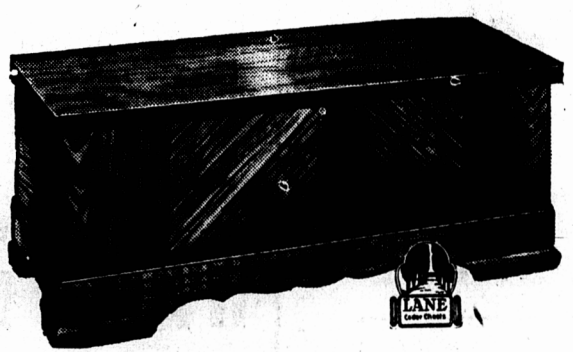

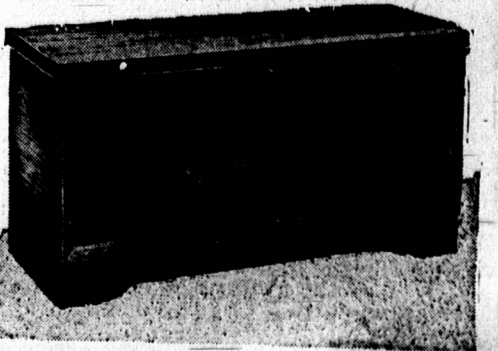
