Holmans Win Two Games To Even Play-Offs With Abbies

Holman's Intermediates of Summerside won two baseball games from the Abbies Intermediates of Charlottetown at Queen Elizabeth Park yesterday afternoon, Paul Schurman getting the win for each game.

The first encounter was a two-inning affair, the completion of last Friday's game which was terminated by darkness with the score 6-6, with one out for the Abbies in the top of the eighth inning, and the count "ball two" on Ryan, lead-off man for the visitors.

Ryan started yesterday's tag end by hitting safely to left. Hood walked, but Ready struck out, and Whitlock grounded out to second. Summerside got two runs in their half of the eighth.

With one out, Jimmie Grady singled to right, and Joe Bernard singled to left, Grady holding up at third. Benny Grady hit through the centre, the hopper eluding Whitlock and Jimmy Grady and Bernard scored. The visitors got one of the runs back in the top of the ninth.

With one out, Lund singled to right, McNeill, pinch-hitting for McKinnon, lifted a towering fly to short. Ralph Pineau, batting for brother Kukor, hit to left, scoring Lund. It looked as if the ball had gotten away from Phillips in left field, and Pineau went on towards the keystone sack, but was tagged out to end the game 8-7 when Phillips threw to Benny Grady. Paul Schurman and Charlie Ryan were the pitchers. Ryan having relieved Murphy on Friday and Schurman having gone in for Bernard.

SECOND GAME
Holman's took the second game, a full nine-inning affair, by the score of 9-7. It was a fairly free-hitting contest, the Abbies getting nine safe singles, and the home team eight. The visitors fighting an uphill battle, twice drew up on even terms with Holman's, 5-5 in the fifth, and 7-7 in the seventh, but each time the Summerside team forged ahead again.

Johnny Carroll shuttled his two pitchers, Joe Bernard and Paul Schurman, back and forth between the mound and short field, and the strategy seemed to pay off. Schurman was pitching when the home forces went ahead in their half of the seventh inning for the last time.

Gunner Cox led the Holman's batsmen with three hits, including a triple, in four trips to the plate. He batted in two runs. Bernard hit two for four, and had three RBIs. Hood was the leading stickler for the Abbies with two doubles and a single in four tries.

Elmer McNeill hit two for five. McNeill hit a homer off Bernard in the fifth frame, living in Whitlock ahead of him, and he had one other RBI. There were no outstanding fielding displays, but the teams were fairly steady in the field, Abbies committing three errors, and Holman Intermediates, two.

The teams are now even in their series, having won two games apiece.



The Island Intermediate baseball playdowns are producing a great battle between pitchers Donnie MacLean of the Abbies and Paul Schurman of the Holmans. Each hurler has figured prominently in the four games that have been played. MacLean won both games in Charlottetown while Schurman gained credit for both Summerside victories yesterday.

Schurman's feat of receiving credit for two victories yesterday is rather unique. So far in the series his record is 2-2.

The Abbies didn't have MacLean yesterday and the Abbies mound corps, other than MacLean hasn't been up to par in this series. Holman's have been using Joe Bernard and Vance Harris behind Schurman. Bernard gets by with his baseball brains while Harris, who is young and strong, has made only one appearance in the series. That was in Charlottetown during the latter part of the opening game.

Harris has done well at the plate in Charlottetown, getting four hits and being robbed of a triple by Phil Murphy. He gets a lot of good wood on the ball and hits solidly when he connects.

It's a new series today. The Abbies came fairly close to winning their first Provincial Intermediate championship in eight years yesterday, but were edged out in a close scoring game. The Abbies heavy hitters haven't been hitting the ball. Lack of practice is one reason and swinging for the fences another. Maybe Lorne MacDougall and Donnie LeClair found a weakness.

MacDougall kept feeding those left handed batters inside curves and drops. Schurman too seems to be having pretty good success with the same pitch.

If the Abbies commence hitting the way they have showed they can hit, Schurman and Company may be in for a rough time. To our way of thinking the Abbies have the hardest hitting lineup in the Province. Elmer MacNeill, Buck Whitlock, Eddy Lund, Jack Ready, Phil Murphy, Charlie Ryan, Gus Flynn and Ralph Pineau can all give that baseball the long ride. They should be sharper by next game due to the fact they held batting practice Monday evening, played on Tuesday and Wednesday. During the summer most of their batting practice was against Don MacLeod in City League games and you don't get much batting practice hitting against MacLeod.

Henry Hartinger won the leading pitcher's award in the City Softball League and the Sport Lodge Trophy which accompanies the award. Hartinger has a win-loss record of 7-1 while Art Ballem his nearest competitor had a record of 7-2. Ballem and Hartinger were tied during most of the schedule, but the Parkdale Lions hung a 12-2 defeat on the Dairy and Ballem in the closing week to knock Art out of the honor.

Merlin MacKenzie was the leading home run hitter with nine circuit blasts. Len Arsenault of Canada Packers had six homers and
