

# Bitterness Of Playoff Feud Spills Into Front Office

**MONTREAL (CP)** — The on-ice bitterness of the Montreal-Toronto Stanley Cup playoff spilled into the front office Friday with a charge by Canadiens president David Molson that Maple Leaf players had instructions from their management to "do as much damage as possible."

"It's disgraceful. It's intolerable," said the youthful Montreal chief executive.

Molson unleashed his assault on the Toronto management on the heels of Thursday night's semi-final opener in which Canadiens downed the Leafs 3-2 in a viciously-played game marred by several incidents and 26 penalties.

"Certain aspects of that game were a disgrace and could only damage hockey's image," he said. "And I blame it strictly on the philosophy and approach of the management of a National Hockey League team."

"It's not the fault of the players or the referees. It was obvious last night that one team had been instructed by its management to go out and do as much damage as possible. It's the management's responsibility and no one else's."

**GRUMBLES ON CHARGES**  
 Toronto president Stafford Smythe, still grumbling over referee Vern Buffey's handling of the playoff opener, tossed aside Molson's charges as "typical Montreal playoff strategy."

"Every year they like to stir up the pot and get it boiling in every direction. Then the fans roar," the referee is in his guard, and before you know it, we're in the penalty box."

"It's Canadiens' standard tactic, but it seems to work in this town anyway."

From NHL president Clarence Campbell, however, came at least indirect support for Molson's allegations.

Campbell said he agreed Thursday night's game "didn't do hockey any good."

"This particular game obviously was played in an atmosphere of intimidation," said Campbell, who watched the contest as a Forum spectator.

As for pinpointing responsibility, the NHL president said he had nothing to say, "other than that I have always felt the policy of any hockey team rests with its owners in every respect."

Molson said he felt personally, the general situation required action by the league to improve hockey's image.

"But it's difficult to impress this on the other governors. It's a different situation in the United States where hockey is not given the same national exposure. They just don't seem to realize the problem."

"It's clear to me, however, that this requires action and it has to start at the management level and nowhere else."

The second game of the semi-finals in the National Hockey League between Montreal Canadiens and Toronto Maple Leafs will be carried on both radio and television starting at 9:30 AST tonight. The Canadiens took the first game 3-2 at the Montreal Forum Thursday night on a powerplay goal by right winger Bobby Rousseau.

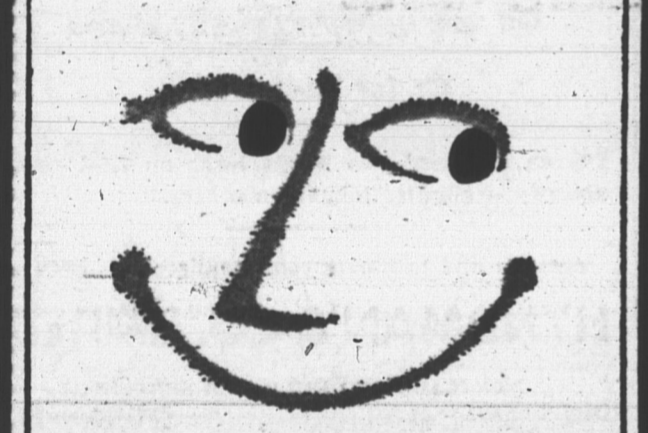

# Nationals Edge Eagles 6-5; Borden Leads Finals Series

**SUMMERSIDE** — Borden's Al Andrews continued his scoring assault on the RCAF Eagles last night.

The helmeted centreman scored his second consecutive hat-trick in as many games and along with teenager Don MacWilliams' three goals led the Nationals to a 6-5 victory over the RCAF Eagles here last night. Borden's win gives them a 2-1 lead in the best of seven UCHL finals.

Andrews' last goal at 5:38 of the third period turned out to be the winner. The Nats, short-handed at the time capitalized on a sloppy play made by the RCAF in their own end. Ev White stole the puck from an Eagle then cleared a pass to Andrews who was left free several feet in front of the net. Andrews promptly drilled a shot through Gord MacLean's pads. Two of MacWilliams' goals were unassisted and came in the first period to highlight a strong comeback by Borden.

The Eagles had opened up a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Jean Paul Guy before six minutes were completed. Marty Martin, Red Gravelle and Les Christian finished the RCAF scoring.

## Junior Legionnaires Host Sydney Juniors

**SUMMERSIDE** — Summerside Junior Legionnaires face an old foe this afternoon at Civic Stadium when they battle Sydney, Cape Breton Post Juniors in the first game for the Maritime Junior hockey championship. The series is a best of three affair.

About a year ago this time, Summerside defeated Sydney here in the opening game of a best of three set, then won the Maritime championship by winning the second in Sydney.

Like Summerside, the Cape Bretoners had very few players returning from last year. Because of new players replacing departed ones, Sydney is a young team, averaging 17 years of age. This may in turn indicate the style of team play.

"We are a balanced team," says Sydney coach Ches Melski who has played junior hockey with Montreal's Bob Rousseau and Ralph Backstrom.

"We play basic hockey and we pass the puck — their main strength. "Everything is a team effort". Spirit is high on the Nova Scotia Club — a major factor why they defeated highly rated Halifax Town and Country. "We think we can beat any team," says Melski.

Sydney, led all year by leading scorer Blair Joseph, disposed of the big, rugged Halifax all-star team three games to two before meeting Summerside. The Cape Bretoners walloped Halifax 8-1 and 11-4 on home ice then after dropping the next two on the road 5-4 and 6-4 won the series with a 6-3 win Wednesday night.

"Halifax was a little nervous the first two games in Sydney," explained Grant MacCharles, manager of the club. "In Sydney the series was tame, then changed the other way around in Halifax," he said.

In this afternoon's game beginning at 2:30 p.m., Melski figures "a good brand of hockey will be played. The fans will see good hockey from both sides. The boys love Summerside and the hospitality is wonderful."

Melski thought each team "will know what they have to face after one game". The second contest is in Sydney Monday.

Summerside Legionnaires coach Grant Grady only said, "we'll certainly be up for this game. If not we'll be in trouble."

# Habs Defeat Toronto Club

The Montreal Canadiens pulled out a squeaker over the Toronto Maple Leafs in the first game of their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final series on Thursday night at the Montreal Forum and at the same time the Detroit Red Wings shaded the Billy Reay coached Chicago forces 4-3 in a cliff-hanger at Detroit.

We saw the TV version of the Toronto-Montreal game and it was pretty well in line with what we expected to see: except the Leafs played just a little bit better than we expected. The Toronto team came out to belt the Canadiens and the Montreal pucksters served notice that they intended to hit back and they outlasted the Toronto club to squeeze out their well earned 3-2 decision. This observer thinks the Toronto club will concentrate more on hockey and less on hitting in Saturday night's battle and the Leafs will square the series at one game apiece before returning to Maple Leaf Gardens.

A sidelight to this game that thoroughly disgusted this columnist was the report that Maurice "Rocket" Richard took a swing at Kent Douglas while the Leaf defenceman was on his way to the dressing room after having received a match penalty for his part in a stick swinging duel with Dave Balon. For a man of Richard's stature in the public eye to lower himself to this level is downright rotten on the part of Mr. Richard.

The Prince of Wales trophy winners drew first blood in their series with the Black Hawks when Normie Ullman beat Glen Hall at the 15 minute mark in the final frame to give the Wings a 4-3 win. We think this series will be squared-up-by-the-first-of-the-week, as well.

Bobby Hull was a doubtful starter for Thursday's contest, but the "blond bomber" was in the lineup and he made his presence felt when he fired a goal and contributed two assists for the losing forces. The general consensus has been that Hull goes, so the Hawks and Hull has served notice that he is ready to contribute his share.

We thought the TV coverage of Thursday night's game, in between periods, was the worst display that has been carried this year. Mr. Selke provided next to nothing with regards to the condition of the injured Montreal players when they were taken to the Forum clinic and the stick swinging duel between Douglas and Dave Balon which is something we would have liked to see and we feel the majority of viewers were more than slightly interested in this unfortunate incident, wasn't shown with the highlights.

The Toronto player that impressed this writer greatly throughout the battle was the aging Dickie Moore who had an illustrious career with the Montreal organization before coming out of retirement to perform with the George Imlach coached forces. Moore was a scoring threat all night and at the eight minute mark of the third period he scored the Leafs first goal and it was sheer determination that guided the puck into the Montreal cage from the fiery winger's stick. The saddest looking player on the Toronto club was Andy Bathgate. Over on the Montreal bench big Jean Beliveau was a big cog in the Blake machine.

**Tid Bits From Here And There**  
 Quarterback Bernie Faloney wants more than \$200,000 to play for the Montreal Alouettes of the Eastern Football Conference during the next three years, a Toronto newspaper reported. The Globe and Mail said the 32-year-old signal caller, traded to the Alouettes from the Hamilton Tiger-Cats during the winter in an eight-player deal, asked to be sold to the Toronto Argonauts if Montreal would not pay the \$200,000 for a three-year contract.

Right-fielder Roger Maris of New York Yankees was charged with assaulting center fielder of the pennant-winning Los Angeles Angels during a fight in a Fort Lauderdale bar. Maris posted \$200 bond and his hearing was set for next Tuesday. The charge was filed by Jerome Modzelwski of Fort Lauderdale who said the fight occurred Wednesday night.
