Visitors for the 24 prisoners were required to have the usual permit from the sheriff before they were allowed a 20-minute visit on Christmas Day.

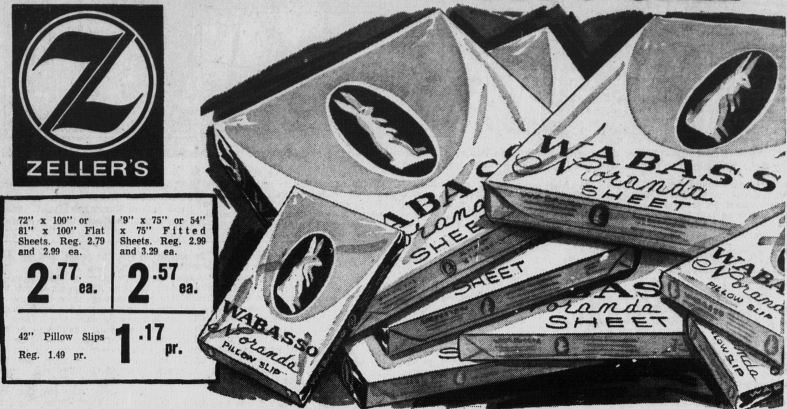
In the afternoon the prisoners gathered together to play cards and other games.

## First Crossing Made At Langley Plant Causeway

MONTAGUE - Work is nearing completion on the causeway between the Town of Montague and Langley Frooted Foods Ltd. Recently, Ernest MacLure, electrical engineer with the company, crossed the new causeway with one of his own vehicles, thus having made the first crossing with the exception of the doors. Mr. MacLure is a member of the Montague Town Council and has been employed with Langley since they began construction about two years ago.

The causeway will shorten the route to the Langley Plant to about 100 yards from the town instead of the almost three miles around. Workers employed by the company can now reach work by a short walk.

## Robbery Case Is Set Over

Lloyd Walter Fall, charged with attempted robbery, was remanded to next Tuesday when he appears in City Police Court Thursday morning. On a previous court appearance he had entered a guilty plea to the charge and was remanded for sentencing.

Thursday Magistrate James Haslam, QC, heard the case of Sidney E. Green, wholesale confectioner, and those of two other employees relating to the robbery attempt.

Melvin MacFadyen told of the accused entering the office on Queen Street and demanding the cash box which was held by Mr. Green, a recognized gun expert and collector of weapons, told the Magistrate his familiarity with hand guns led him to a closer look at the weapon then pointed at him and he detected it as a fake.

He then grappled with the would-be bandit and called for help which was supplied by other employees from the adjacent warehouse. This was corroborated by Garnet Buehl, a salesman.

Both witnesses testified the accused was struggling until overpowered.

## Restaurant Licence Case Adjudged Till Monday

The case against John Henry Reid charged with operating a restaurant without first obtaining a license to do so was adjudged to Tuesday morning by Magistrate James Haslam in City Police Court Thursday.

Four witnesses were heard before the accused was called to the stand. On conclusion of his testimony another witness was called but was not in court and the case was adjourned.

Elizabeth Reid, sister of the accused, testified she took over the restaurant in June 1963 after previously being employed with the Bill Lynch Shows. She said she paid rent of \$250 monthly to her brother but was three months in arrears. Miss Reid stated she made all purchases for the restaurant and paid for them as well as hiring and paying any restaurant employees. Mr. Reid said he had operated the restaurant known as John's Fish and Chips since he started it in 1953 or 1954. He had turned it over to his sister in June last year to enable him to start a carnival operation with John Holmes. He stated he

now had nothing to do with operation of the restaurant. He testified no change had been made in the partnership filed. It is expected the case will be concluded on Tuesday.

## Accused Fined For Assault

Leslie Alfred Affleck, Charlottetown student, was fined \$80 and costs, with an alternative of 20 days in jail, when Magistrate James Haslam found him guilty of assault in City Police Court Thursday morning. Several witnesses were called by counsel for the complainant and the defendant. Gerald Foster, QC, represented the complainant while Lester O'Donnell appeared for the defendant.

Three men appearing on charges involving liquor had 20-day sentences suspended, another was fined \$80 and costs and a fifth was sent to jail for 20 days. Robert Younker was fined \$15 and costs for driving 35 miles per hour in a 20-mile zone on North River Road.

## Temperature Tops Record

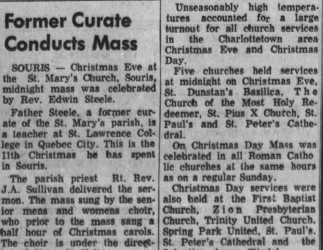
Record breaking mild unseasonable and dull, damp weather covered Charlottetown and all other sections of the province on Christmas Day.

The Charlottetown Radio Range reported that the high was 51 degrees and the low was 42. The snow that lay on the ground previous to this mild spell is virtually all gone. Unproved roads throughout the province are very soft and travelling on them is difficult.

Contrasting the mild, almost green Christmas that the Island is experiencing for the first time in a number of years are the Vancouver and Fraser Valley areas of British Columbia. The West Coast areas had their first white Christmas since 1951.

Unseasonably high temperatures accounted for a large turnout for all church services in the Charlottetown area Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.
