The latter looked at them and said: "Yes, it is a pretty stone. I have a mantelpiece made of it in the next room."

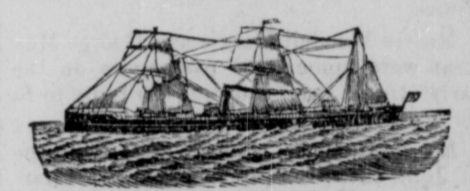
