## NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

### CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, Oct. 25.  
Judgment was given to-day by Judge  
McKay in the great Orange case, Grant vs.  
Beaudry. The court dismissed the action  
on technical grounds, one being that the  
defendant was a public officer and was en-  
titled to a month's notice of action before  
the action was entered, whereas he only  
had ten days notice. In the notice of ac-  
tion the residences of Counsel for the de-  
fence were not mentioned as the law pro-  
vided. There were many persons present  
when judgement was given.

OTTAWA, Oct. 26.

The contract for the St. Anne's Locks  
has been awarded to O'Connor & Cassidy,  
of Ottawa. They are said to be very low,  
and doubts are expressed of their accept-  
ing.

A classification of Ordnance and Ad-  
miralty lands in New Brunswick and Nova  
Scotia is published.

The Direct United States Cable Co. will  
apply next session for an act to extend its  
corporate character to the Dominion, to en-  
able it to perfect cable communication with  
Great Britain and the Dominion, and to  
revoke the letters patent of the Dominion  
issued on the 17th May, 1875, incorporat-  
ing the Direct United States Cable Co.,  
limited.

The Supreme Court meets on Tuesday,  
and all the Judges are now in the city.  
Among the cases in which judgment will  
probably be given is the celebrated Great  
Seal case of Nova Scotia. Judgment will  
be given almost immediately in the Mont-  
gomery election case. The Bellechasse  
election appears in precisely the same po-  
sition. There are also election appeals from  
South Ontario.

### UNITED STATES.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 24.

Mrs. Margaret Smith was yesterday  
awarded \$2,000 damages for injuries sus-  
tained by being thrown out of a steamer on  
a voyage to this country in 1877. She  
claimed that the surgeon of the ship aban-  
doned her in a fainting condition and she  
was tossed about on a wet, filthy floor for  
an hour by the rolling of the ship.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

James Sullivan entered the station of the  
Elevated Railway this afternoon, purchased  
a ticket, walked out on the platform, drew  
a knife, deliberately cut his own throat  
and jumped from the platform into the  
street below. Though still alive he is  
dangerously injured.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.

A despatch to the Interior Department,  
mentions the surrender by the Ute Indians  
of the women and children captured by  
them at the time the Agent Meeker was  
killed. The tenor of the news from the  
special Agent who secured the surrender of  
the white captives, is such that the Indian  
bureau have reason to hope that further  
hostilities may be averted.

BOSTON, Oct. 26.

Mass meetings in aid of the tenant farm-  
ers in Ireland were held to-day in Lowell,  
Mass., and New Orleans, Louisiana.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.

Further details of the burning of the  
steamer Nuena Pajaro state that the en-  
gineers were suffocated to death at their  
engines. The heat of the fire was extreme  
and when it reached the petroleum and  
other inflammable material of which the  
cargo consisted, a tremor seemed to go  
through the entire length of the main deck  
as if the vessel was bursting asunder from  
the terrible pressure. The men were dread-  
fully burned as they stood at the pumps  
and now all abandoned them in the wildest  
terror and rushed for the boats, which  
swamped as fast as lowered. The sea was  
black with human beings who jumped over-  
board to escape the flames; but, with a few  
others saved by clinging to a piece of the  
vessel, the steamer burned to the water and  
sunk.

### GREAT BRITAIN.

MANCHESTER, Oct. 26.

Liberal demonstrations continued here  
Saturday. The Marquis of Hartington and  
John Bright made speeches vehemently at-  
tacking the Government.

### AFGHANISTAN.

LONDON, Oct. 16.

A Cabul despatch states that the Katwal  
of Cabul and four others have been hanged  
for complicity in the massacre of the British  
Embassy.

### SPAIN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 35.

Details of the horrors of the flood at  
Murcia, Spain, are harrowing, but are re-  
lieved by accounts of the heroism of those  
who saved hundreds from drowning in  
their houses. At Alicante also, the com-  
mercial port of Valencia, the whole plain  
was covered with raging waters which form  
a lake nearly thirty miles in extent. The  
inundation passed over the enormous stone  
table in which Alicante is inlaid, streamed  
through its arches, its half dark piazzas and  
narrow streets, and wrought havoc only  
second to that which ravaged the plain of  
Murcia. The amount of damage is fifty  
million francs! It is feared the loss of life  
will exceed 3,000.

### TRADE IN HALIFAX.

The fish exports to the West Indies last  
week were 1,355 tierces, 2,754 drums, 185  
boxes, 40 half-boxes dry; 879 bbls., 15  
half-bbls. pickled fish. The previous week  
there were 513 tierces, 2,946 drums, 1,110  
boxes, 816 half-boxes dry; 717 bbls., 26  
half-bbls. pickled fish.

The imports of sugar and molasses reach-  
ed 127 puns., 9 tierces; sugar 228 hds.,  
8 bbls.

### SMUGGLING IN NOVA SCOTIA.

The Collector of Canning, N. S., Mr  
Rand, after seizing some tea and oil which  
had been smuggled, laid hands on the  
vessel in which the goods were brought  
from Boston. The craft—the "Susan M."  
—was found at Port Williams and duly  
taken possession of. The "Herald" says—

"The parties concerned in the smuggling,  
as usual in such cases, appear to be very  
innocent of the affair. The importer thought  
that the captain had entered his goods, but  
the captain tells quite a different story. All  
the parties feel very badly because they  
have been caught, but the Collector is de-  
termined to stop smuggling at this port;  
and all parties concerned therein will be  
obliged to be sharper than the party now  
caught."

### SUGAR FOR MONTREAL.

The Halifax "Herald" of Saturday states  
that in five days of the previous week  
2,000 hds. of refining sugar were trans-  
ferred from Halifax to Montreal for the  
Redpaths.

### LUMBER AT OTTAWA.

An Ottawa despatch of Saturday says:—  
"Lumbermen report that an increased  
quantity of logs will be got out this winter,  
owing to the revival of the sawn lumber  
trade. The square timber trade has not  
improved."

### EMIGRANTS.

It is reported that a Toronto firm is  
about contracting with an Ocean Steam-  
ship Company to convey emigrants from  
England to Manitoba in the spring, at only  
\$10 a head for grown up people.

The Dominion Government has obtained  
right of way from Point Levi to Chaudiere  
Junction, where the Intercolonial and the  
Grand Trunk meet. The distance is six  
miles.

### MANITOBA WHEAT.

Sixty-four and a half pounds is the  
weight per bushel of wheat of the red fern  
sort, raised this season in one locality in  
Manitoba. What do our farmers think of  
that.

### BOSTON MARKET ON OCT. 24.

Potatoes—There is rather a short supply  
of potatoes at the roads, and Northern Rose  
are firm at 45 to 47 cents per bushel, and  
Eastern are selling at 50 to 55 cent. Sweet  
potatoes are firm at \$2 per barrel. Onions  
range from \$2.25 to 2.50 per barrel.

Oats—There is a limited demand, but  
the market is firm at prices ranging from 45  
to 51 cents for the various grades of oats,  
including extra at the latter figure.

Butter—There is an advance in the finer  
grades of butter, and 25 to 26 is the  
market for fine fall-made New York and  
Vermont dairy, and some few sales have  
been made a trifle above these figures.  
Straight dairies, including fall ends, are  
firm at 21 to 23 cents, and good ones at 19  
to 20 cents. The receipts of Western but-  
ter are taken at 16 to 19 for lard packed,  
and 21 to 24 cents for freshly-made dairy-  
packed.

Eggs—The market was firm to-day at  
20 to 21 cents per dozen for Northern,  
P. E. Island and Eastern, and 18 to 20  
for Western.

### SILVER MINING IN MAINE.

The Acton Silver Mining Company has  
reorganized. The company is located in  
Acton, Maine, has a capital of \$500,000  
divided into shares at a dollar a share. It  
is believed that the conditions under which  
silver is found in Maine exist in Charlotte  
County, N. B.

### FAVORABLE BRITISH TRADE REPORTS.

A London despatch dated Oct. 23rd,  
says: A favorable change has come over
