EX EMPRESS EUGENIE is to start at once for
Zululand.

FURTHER FLOODS are anticipated in Spain
from recent excessive rains.

MONTREAL has eight skating rinks, exclusive
of those which may be formed on the river, to
support this winter.

THE Italian budget shows a surplus of
5,000,000 lire, after providing for a reduction
of the grist tax.

AUSTRIAN STATESMEN are becoming uneasy
at the extensive Russian defence works near
the Austrian frontier.

THE Agent-General in London, for South
Australia, learns by telegram that there will
be 375,000 tons of wheat for exportation.

THE latest British emigration returns show
that 55,019 persons emigrated in the last quar-
ter—37,110 were English, 6,727 Scotch, and
12,182 Irish.

EGYPT is completing preparations for war
with Abyssinia, and has a force of 20,000 men
ready for service in the event of hostilities
breaking out.

HENRY LAWY SELWYN, a full-blooded
Sioux Indian and a son of a leading chief of
the Yankton tribe, has been ordained pastor
of the church at Yankton.

THE French Government has ordered an
exploration to be made of the country be-
tween the Senegal and Niger rivers, to deter-
mine the practicability of running a railroad
between the two rivers.

It is interesting to note that Sir Evelyn
Wood, the hero of the Zulu campaign, who
"left nothing to chance," has been appointed
to the command of the Belfast District, with
the local rank of Brigadier General.

THE press despatches state that the Wes-
leyan Chapel in London, founded by John
Wesley, narrowly escaped total destruction
on Sunday. The Chapel was gutted, but the
pulpit used by the founder of Methodism was
saved.

THE inmates of the Lunatic Asylum were
removed to the new Hospital to-day. Now,
what's to be done with the old Asylum build-
ing? Rumor says that the paupers are to be
removed to it. We hope it will not be allowed
to go to ruin.

THE cold wave seems to have spread over
the greater part of Europe. In England, the
upper Thames is frozen over. Numerous dis-
asters are reported among the Swiss moun-
tains, caused by the heavy snow storms. In
Paris the snow has stopped traffic.

THE contractor for pumps and wells denies
that the pump near DesBrisay's corner is al-
lowed to remain dry most of the time. He
says there is no truth whatever in the report
we published yesterday. All we can say is
that the complaint came from a tax-payer who
lives near by.

AN alarming sickness, said to be the black
fever, is reported prevalent at Sillery Cove,
Quebec, which seems to deal very summarily
with its victims. Two people—Mrs. Jack
Hagens and her servant girl—are reported to
have died from it within an hour after taking
ill, and were buried on Thursday, at the
church of St. Colomba.

A Cairo despatch says:—"Information from
Vassoway represents King John as marching
forward with the main body of the Abyssinian
army and forty guns." It is said that he
is determined to occupy the districts of Senaar
and Galabat, in the Blue Nile territory. He
declares the European intervention will not
prevent him from enforcing his just cause, in-
cluding indemnity for past aggression.

POTATOES FOR SEED.—We were shown on
Tuesday at Arch'd McNeill's Auction Room a
very fine looking sample of potatoes from the
farm of Alex. Smith, Esq., Powal, Lot 48.
In the spring of 1877 Mr. Smith received from
his son, at Vancouver Island, British Colum-
bia, 4 lbs of these potatoes which he planted,
the product of which he again planted in the
spring of 1878, from which he has had a yield
this fall of about 1,500 bushels which are now
offered for seed. This potato is called the
"Royal Adelaide," is white, entirely free
from disease or rot, is of choice cooking qual-
ity and very productive, as shown by the
above statement. Mr. Smith has shipped 100
boxes of the "Royal Adelaide" to Liverpool,
England, by the "Prince Edward," feeling
confident that they will meet with ready and
remunerative sale in the home market.

PROHIBITION IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—New
foundland has a clause in its license law some-
what similar to the Permissive Bill in Canada.
A recent issue of the "Royal Gazette" of that
colony contains the following:—"By public
notice in to-day's 'Gazette' it will be seen
that a requisition has been presented to the
Stipendiary Magistrate at Carbonear, from
over one-fifth of the registered electors of the
district of Bay-de-Verds, requiring that a vote
may be taken to determine whether two-
thirds of the qualified electors polled are in
favor of a proclamation being issued prohib-
iting the sale of intoxicating liquors in that dis-
trict; and that his Excellency the Governor
has directed that polls for deciding the ques-
tion shall be taken in the said District on the
6th January next."

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.

Hon. Mr. Chapleau, Premier, and Hon.
Mr. Robertson, Treasurer, of Quebec, are
here it is understood with a view of nego-
tiating for the transfer of the North Shore
Railway to the Dominion Government.

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.

A meeting of St. Patrick's Society, the
most influential Irish organization in the
city, was held on Saturday night. Mr.
William Wilson, the President, was in the
chair. Among those present was M. P.
Ryan, M. P., and M. C. Mullarky. A re-
solution was carried sympathizing with the
distress in Ireland, and appointing a com-
mittee of six to make a collection from
house to house in this city to alleviate the
suffering arising therefrom. A resolution
was also passed recommending the Imperial
Government to grant assistance, by public
works and otherwise, to the people in the
west of Ireland. The speeches were very
moderate in tone and sentiment.

TORONTO, Dec. 8.

Hanlan goes to New York this week to
interview Mr. Blaikie, regarding the dis-
posal of the \$6,000 prize. He wishes no
further transaction with Courtney, direct or
indirect. He will probably go to England
in the spring.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

Aspinwall advises detail the damage by a
severe storm which began on November
20th and lasted five days. All the sailing
vessels in the harbor were lost except one;
all the wharves suffered severely. The
damage exceeded that of any previous
storm. All the steamers ran out to sea for
safety. The railway track from Aspinwall
to Panama was submerged several feet in
many places, and houses and hamlets along
the route were inundated.

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 6.

It is reported Eastern capitalists are pro-
posing to head off the proposed Canadian
railway to the fertile Red River of the
North, by building a railway from some
point on the Missouri Central Road and
connecting with the Northern Pacific at Du-
luth.

HARTFORD, Conn.

News has been received here of the death
in Paris, November 30, of Yah Shu Fung,
Secretary of the Chinese Minister Chind au
Pin, from 1873 to 1876. He was attached to
the Chinese educational commission, re-
siding in this city. He returned to China
and came back with the Chinese Embassy a
year ago last August, and went to Madrid
with the Chinese embassy last spring.
There his health failed, and he went to Paris
for medical aid. He was 55 years old.

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 8.

The collections thus far in the Catholic
churches of the Cleveland diocese for
the suffering poor in Ireland amount to
\$3,200.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 8.

The steamer City of Tokio arrived from
Hong Kong via Yokohama, brings advices
to Nov. 13th. Extraordinary diplomatic
rumors are prevailing there which require
notice to give assurance that no unusual
negotiations are progressing and no unex-
pected alliances contemplated. These
rumors point to Russian efforts to secure
co-operation in Central Asia on the basis
of promising support to China against Japan
on the event of future difficulties; also to
German arrangements for unprecedented
influence over the Chinese external policy,
secured by the ingenuity of the present
Russian envoy. As these stories will
doubtless reach America and Europe, it is
desirable to state that there is no shadow of
a real change in Chinese relations.

GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

The Queen, to-day, at Windsor Castle,
received the officers and men who distin-
guished themselves in the Zulu war, and
will confer the Victoria Cross and other
decorations on one Corporal and three Pri-
vates of the Rorke's Drift Garrison. Gen-
erals Newdigate, Crealock and Pearson and
other South African commanders will at-
tend the ceremony.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

The Indian steamer "Eldorado" laid 30
hours in the Bay of Biscay last week at the
mercy of the storm, and put into Plymouth
Saturday for repairs.

IRISH AFFAIRS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

A Castlereagh (Dublin) despatch to the
Herald says the meeting yesterday was a
gathering of about 5,000 vigorous looking
men. During Parnell's speech a rush was
made to sweep off the Government report-
ers, but twenty constables who surrounded
them, brought their guns to bear, and the
crowd fell back. Parnell then had the re-
porters brought to the stand and guaranteed
their safety, if the constable were with-
drawn, which was done; but the mob was
dissatisfied. Patrick Egan made a speech
in which he said the rents paid did not come
from the soil but came from America.

ROME.

ROME, Dec. 8.

The Fanfalla has reason to believe that
an understanding on the Greek frontier and
Egyptian question has been arrived at be-
tween the Governments of Berlin, Vienna
and Rome.
