Electric Plant Gasoline Use Discussed By S'side Council

SUMMERSIDE — Considerable discussion centred on the question of how to obtain information regarding how much gasoline is used at the electric light plant at the meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening presided over by Mayor W. A. Currie.

Councillor Leo Wood, chairman of the finance committee stated he had asked two months ago for a statement on how much was being used at the plant. He said he did not get any report so he went to the man who dispensed the gasoline and he told him, the Councillor stated, that he had been instructed by town manager Mr. Brophy and the Mayor not to give out this information.

Mayor Currie replied that the same man came to him and the Mayor had informed him that the information was available to the Councillors at the town office where a report is filed every month. The Mayor stated it was not revealed to him who had been inquiring about the gasoline.

Mr. Brophy said the man had advised him to give a report on the gasoline but he decided against doing so. It was then revealed the man referred to was Lowell Phillips.

Railway Workers Get Certificates

MONCTON — Moncton shops of the Canadian National Railways, home of the system's senior first aid champions, reached another milestone Friday in a long history of promoting first aid and safety among the staff.

Ninety-nine employees were presented with St. John Ambulance first aid awards signifying that they had been successful in examinations after completing various stages of their training.

Highlight of the ceremony was the presentation of ten-year certificates marking a decade of training by D.V. Gauder, vice-president and general manager of the company's Atlantic region, to Edwin B. Mitchell, Gerald Paul Sawson, Albert E. Knapper and Philip R.J. LeBlanc.

Sixty men, including the four ten-year men, were presented with labels symbolic of four or more years training; six got medals for three years; nine were given vouchers for two years; and 24 got their first-year certificates.
