## THE ELECTIONS

### THE OUTLOOK IN THE PROVINCES

And the Territories—A Change in New Brunswick.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—Ontario in the bye-elections has returned 45 Liberals and 40 Conservatives and seven so-called Independents, all of whom on all party questions have been supporters of the Government. Its representation was, therefore, Liberals 52, Conservatives 40.

According to the reports received the Conservatives are certain of redeeming 14 seats, so that the representation from Ontario in the next House will be Conservatives 53 and Liberals 39.

The fourteen seats which Conservatives will carry are, Hamilton (2), Ottawa (2), Cardwell, Leeds and Grenville, North Simcoe, Cornwall and Stormont, Fontenac, Centre Toronto, Brockville, Kingston, East Hastings and South Victoria.

This is a moderate estimate, and it is more than probable that the Conservative majority in Ontario will be over 20.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 29.—In Manitoba it is altogether improbable that the Liberals will be able to retain more than one of the seven seats for the province, and the Conservatives are looking for a clean sweep of the province.

VICTORIA, Oct. 29.—In British Columbia the Liberals, four years ago returned four of six members. They may return one this year; but even this is doubtful.

REGINA, Oct. 29.—In 1898 the Northwest Territories elected two Liberals, one Conservative and one Independent. This year four Conservatives will be elected.

ST. JOHN'S, Oct. 29th.—So far as can be seen now there is no chance of the government improving its position in this province.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has now six seats out of fourteen. Five were carried in election, and one has been gained by the defection of Mr. Bostigan.

All these six are in danger, and in four, the advantage seems, at present, to be with the Opposition.

Mr. Blair is fighting for his life in a constituency which Mr. Ellis carried against the late government by a large majority, and the chance of Colonel Tucker holding the country seat seems to be small.

Albert, King's, Victoria, and Queen's are conceded by the government supporters to be doubtful, and are claimed by the Opposition.

On the other hand the Conservatives claim five of their eight seats as certain, and admit that the other three are uncertain, though in each of them the party locally are sanguine.

Elections are uncertain things; but if there is anything sure about this one, it is that the government will be beaten in New Brunswick.

## THE CHINESE TROUBLE.

## A DOUBTFUL REPORT.

Boers Said to Be Still 15,000 Strong.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—According to a despatch from Cape Town a force of Boers surrounded a patrol of Cape Police with a convoy near Hoopstad, Orange River Colony, on Wednesday. The police were compelled to abandon two maxims. They were ultimately reinforced by Yeomanry and succeeded in getting away with the convoy. But it cost seven killed, eleven wounded and fifteen captured.

The Boers have still fifteen thousand men in the field, nearly half being in the Orange River Colony.

Important Meeting on Saturday—Mrs. Gardiner's Report.

In the absence of the President Mrs Johnson kindly presided. Mrs. C. C. Gardiner gave a very interesting report of the annual meeting of the National Council at Victoria, B. C., in July last, and the many branches of good and successful work it is engaged in, and spoke of the effort being made to interest our people in the history of this grand country of ours, not only in research but by study, also of the Teachers Federated Association and an appeal for a Teachers' Standard Certificates, salaries irrespective of sex, etc.

The meeting expressed itself in favor of asking the National Council to meet in Charlottetown in 1901.

## PEAKE'S STATION MEETING.

THE meeting at Peake's Station on Saturday evening was a great success. The large school-house was crowded to the doors by electors from King's and East Queen's. Henry R. Mooney, Esq., occupied the chair, and the popular Conservative candidate, A. C. McDonald, opened the meeting by a very able speech which was listened to with great attention. Senator Ferguson then followed for about one hour arraiving the Government for their broken promises and corrupt deals. He was followed by Messrs Jas. McIlrae, J. Dewar and Jos. Doyle, each of whom made capital speeches. The meeting broke up at a late hour with hearty cheers for Mr. McDonald. Both Mr. McDonald and Mr. Martin are gaining fresh support amongst the electors of this part of the country.
