THE MYSTIC TIE.

A BEAUTIFUL illustration of the universality of the Masonic Brotherhood, and recognition of the duties it claims from its members, was given on last Sunday afternoon in the Episcopal churchyard in the rear of Southport, opposite our city.

Some days ago Captain Hewison, of Chatham, N. B., arrived at Belle Creek, in the barque St. Michael, to load the cargo of a wrecked vessel, and was then to return home, the vessel's own Captain taking charge; but on Friday afternoon Captain Hewison was seized with a violent fit of coughing, and bursting a blood vessel, expired suddenly.

Though sad to die away from home and family, this was rendered more so, as the last consolation of having the remains taken home was made difficult by distance, that it was decided to bury them at Southport, where they had been immediately brought. A prominent townsman and Mason of "Miramichi; Chatham Lodge," N. B., telegraphed that body here, of the deceased, "old and good standing in the Order," and though the notice was so short, "King Solomon Lodge," of this city, took charge of the arrangements, and with some members of "Victoria" and "St. John's," formed a procession of over seventy Masons. Arrived at the grave, the Rev. D. Fitzgerald, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, read the beautiful service, followed by Past Master Small in the deeply impressive and solemn ceremony of Free and Accepted Masons.

The deceased left a wife and two children, with whom, weary waiting for the old familiar face that is hidden from view and the sound of the voice that is still, we deeply sympathise.

WAR DISPATCHES.

(Special to the Daily Examiner.) LONDON, Aug. 27. The battle of Kurukdara, which took place on the 25th, lasted fourteen hours. The Turks attempted to flank the Russian defences, but the latter resisted successfully.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 25. Accounts of the battle before Eski Saghra are very fragmentary. The recent Russian official account states that the Turks took the offensive in great force on the 22nd inst., and drove back two Russian battalions from Jaslar.

LONDON, Aug. 25. It is officially announced that all the Great Powers, and Belgium, Holland, Sweden and Portugal, have adhered to the German protest against the Turkish cruelties.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 25. The Russian bulletin, relative to the battle at Schipka Pass, says: "Fighting continued all Friday. Our troops retain all their positions. Our losses during the four days fighting have been considerable, 27 wounded officers and 900 men being brought to Gabrova. The number of the killed is unknown. The cannonade in the Pass was renewed Saturday morning."
