CONCLUDING SESSION OF CONVENTION FRIDAY—1940 PLACE OF MEETING UNDECIDED.

(Fredericton Gleaner Aug. 26th)

W. J. Gaynor of MeAdam Junction was yesterday afternoon elected president of the Maritime Branch of the Canadian Postmaster's Association, President Gaynor, retiring vice-president of the branch, succeeded J. H. T. Nicholson of Sydney Mines N. S.

The convention elected J. W. Merkel of Digby, vice-president of the Branch and the following additional members of the executive: for Nova Scotia, A. R. Read of Rockingham Station and T. E. Spencer of River Philip; for New Brunswick, Alec Taylor of Saint John and E. A. Shaw of Pocologan; for Prince Edward Island, P. J. McInnis of Port Borden. The appointment of a secretary-treasurer is left in the hands of the new executive. A. R. Read of Rockingham Nova Scotia, has filled this office in the past year.

The last session of the annual convention, held in the Provincial Normal School at Fredericton, passed a resolution strongly approving the stand of the Dominion Executive of the Postmaster's Association that no Canadian postmaster or postmistress should be dismissed for political partisanship without a specific charge and an opportunity to prove his or her innocence and, further, asserting that it is the concern of the Association that every Canadian postmaster so accused should receive British fair play.

It was decided that a revision of membership fees in the Association should be left to the Dominion Executive. The place for the next annual convention of the Maritime Branch was left to the executive by an amendment to a motion to meet in Sydney Mines.

The afternoon session was opened yesterday by a piano solo by Miss Sullivan, daughter of Postmaster Sullivan of St. Stephen. The earlier part of the business programme included a postal service knowledge competition which was won jointly by H. A. Clarke of Newcastle and P. J. McInnis of Borden, Prince Edward Island. The prize was divided.

The prize committee made its report and prizes were presented. The James S. Neil prize for the postmaster traveling the farthest distance was awarded to Postmaster MacDormand of Westport, Nova Scotia, who travelled 520 miles to attend the convention. The E. A. Shaw prize for the eldest postmaster attending the convention was won by Postmaster Smullen of Lower Southampton N. B. S.

In addition to these prizes, gifts were distributed among all the ladies present. The surplus was disposed of by a general draw among all others attending the convention. Prizes by the St. Croix Soap Company were disposed of in the same way. A motion of thanks was passed and will be extended to the two companies.

A presentation of cigars was made to C. D. Griffith of Estevan, Saskatchewan, Dominion Secretary. Motions of appreciation were extended to His Worship Mayor Forbes, the citizens of Fredericton, the Provincial Government, the County of York and the Fredericton Board of Trade. A message from Hon. J. B. McNair, Minister-General, expressed his regrets at being unable to attend any of the sessions of the convention. Short speeches of thanks were delivered by the new officers and thanks extended to the retiring president and preceding president, Col. E. J. White of Bathurst.
