ace, so that the king would be captured — in which case the double might be greeted with a redouble, but that risk had to be taken.

The expert reasoning back of this lead-directing double runs as follows:

If West is left to his own opening-lead selection, the slam may or may not be fulfilled, depending on the accuracy of the opposing bidding and the position of aces. If the contract will fall on any opening lead so much the better for East's double. Perhaps, however, South can claim the slam on a normal lead, and collect 1430 points. That is East's main consideration. If, by risking an additional 500 points (the penalty he'd have to pay if the enemy redoubled successfully) he can substantially increase his chance to beat the slam, it is obviously sound to take the risk.

Moreover, in doubling and thereby demanding the lead of the diamond suit bid by North, East knows that there is little danger of incurring a redouble. The opponents also know the meaning of the double; they are not apt to redouble when they can count on losing the first trick to a ruff!

Observe that only a diamond opening can beat the slam, and observe also that West would not be likely to make that lead on his own.
