U.S. In Strong Protest To Syria

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States Wednesday ousted Syria's ambassador from his post here and also ordered a Syrian Embassy second secretary to leave the country by Friday. The state department also announced that U.S. ambassador James S. Moose Jr., who is in Washington, "is not returning to Syria."

At the same time, the United States set a "strong protest" to Syria against a "government-inspired slanderous campaign" which has been conducted against the U.S. in connection with an alleged American plot to overthrow the Syrian government. The U.S. further protested "interference" with an American diplomatic courier at the Syrian border two days ago and denounced Syria's action in ousting three officers of the American Embassy at Damascus.

Canadian Dollar At 24-Year High

NEW YORK (AP)—The Canadian dollar closed Wednesday at a premium of more than 5 1/2 cents, highest in nearly 24 years. The Canadian dollar at the close of trading was valued at \$1.05 17/32 in U.S. money. That's the biggest edge it has held over the U.S. dollar since November, 1933, when it was worth \$1.05% in U.S. funds.

OTTAWA (CP) — Measles has broken out among Eskimos aboard the Arctic supply ship C. D. Howe, it was learned Wednesday.

The RCAF announced that it will fly anti-measles serum to Resolute Bay on Cornwallis Island before the C. D. Howe arrives there in three or four days. The air force said the plane carrying the serum should arrive at Resolute Friday.

Dr. J. H. Wiebe of the Indian and northern health service asked the RCAF to rush the serum to Resolute to protect Eskimos there before the C. D. Howe's arrival. He explained that the native population must be protected from measles before the return.

Death came in her eightieth year following a prolonged period of illness. Her sister, Winnifred Driscoll of Edmonton, and her nephew, Wilfrid Driscoll of Charlottetown, attended her funeral which was held on Saturday, August 10th.

India Marks 10th Birthday As An Independent Nation

NEW DELHI (AP) — Ancient India marks her 10th birthday as an independent nation Thursday.

The occasion will also mark the 10th anniversary of India's first and only prime minister—Jawaharlal Nehru. And there's no indication he is thinking of stepping down.

As Nehru journeys to Kerala to make the traditional Independence Day speech, many of his listeners may muse over the popular question both here and abroad: After Nehru, who? The question arises because Nehru towers so high above all around him. No one is so idolized by India's millions. No one's word carries so much weight. No one in the government makes so many decisions.

Many political observers believe that when Nehru finally does go, the government will swing slightly to the right. BUT NOT FAR.

The swing probably will not go too far, however. India's shortage of capital, the nature of some of the projects which must be undertaken, and the undeveloped country and the countless other factors, will probably call for a

socialist-type government for years to come. But even today, Nehru is to the left of most of his own cabinet members. After his departure, the influence of these conservative elements probably will be felt more strongly.

The man most often mentioned as Nehru's successor is Morarji Desai, 61-year-old minister of commerce and industry. Desai played a prominent role in the Congress party's campaign for Indian independence. In recent years he has shown himself a good administrator as chief minister of Bombay state.

Many influential Indians in and out of the government would like to see Nehru retire. They have the highest regard for his ability. But they believe it would be good for the country to see if it could get along without him. It would give the nation confidence, they say, and after all Nehru would always be on hand in case of a pinch.

Others feel that for this very reason it would be futile for Nehru to step down. They contend that Nehru's influence would remain so strong that no successor as prime minister could really be his own master.

New Feature Added To Calf Scramble At Fair

A new feature has been added to the calf scramble at the Provincial Exhibition and an interesting prelude has been prepared. As a consolation prize for the boys who do not win a calf in the "Scramble," the fair is providing two greased pigs for the spectators at the same time. The ones who catch the pigs, and hold them, will take them home.

The scramble goes on at 11 a.m. Friday. A half-hour before that the special awards such as banners won by premier exhibitors and breeders, and any special trophies, etc. will be presented to the winners. This will necessarily include a parade of some of the grand champion animals who will appear as their owners come up to claim their trophies.

This feature of the show will be at 10:30 a.m. The scene will be the Jones Livestock Arena, so named in memory of the

late Senator J. Walter Jones of Bunbury who was formerly Premier of Prince Edward Island.

Central Royalty Breeders Top Winners In Ayrshires

The veteran Ayrshire firm of V. MacRae and Son Central royalty came through again yesterday with the major share of the honors and prize money at the Provincial Exhibition. They took six championship ribbons and won the majority of their classes.

They were given close competition in several of the events however by the Raedale Farm herd, Charlottetown R.R. 3 and also by the herd of Brent Stead Sours a comparative newcomer to the show ring at Charlottetown. The MacRae's took the senior and grand championship ribbons in both male and female divisions. They had a reserve junior champion in the males and the same in the females. They had seventeen red ribbons and numerous lesser prizes.

The Stead herd came through with the reserve senior and reserve grand female ribbons and they also took the junior male championship. The Raedale herd took the reserve senior and reserve grand male with their Fairvue Fashion Bandman and they had the junior female ribbon wrapped up securely with Raedale Lorelee, a faty and a smooth little senior calf.

OLD PERFORMANCE

The veteran show bull, Fairvue Fashion Bandman was the senior and grand male champion for the MacRae's. It is an old performance for this animal who has been winning similar ribbons here for some years. He has also won at Amherst and has placed well at the Royal on occasion. Their senior and grand female champion was Fairvue Bright Lass 2nd. She is a daughter of Fairvue Bright Lass and her sire was Dunduff Gilt Edge. The bull that was imported from Scotland several years ago by the P.E. Island Ayrshire Breeders Association several years ago.

The Stead bull that took the Junior championship was Linwood Diamond. As the name implies, he was bred in the Linwood Farm herd of St. Oland in Nova Scotia. His dam was a Scottish cow named Honey-suckle. His sire was Dyke Double Diamond. The Estate of George L. Boswall showed only on two entries but they were good ones. For example they had the red ribbon winner in the mature female (dry class). They had a fourth prize winner in the junior yearling male class. Willard Prowse, Brackley and

Gerry Doyle, Vernon River were others who won places with their cattle. Mr. Prowse had several really good placings. The show missed the herds of Keith Boswell and Son of Victoria and of Col F.I. Andrew, East Royal. Both were entered but were unable to bring in their cattle.

GENERAL REGRET
There was genuine regret expressed in the ring by both competitors and spectators that Ed Boswall has had a serious breakdown in health since the

last show here. Ed has shown at Charlottetown, at Amherst and at Royal on different occasions. He is recognized as a hard worker and a terrific competitor. Several asked the Guardian to express their regret that he was unable to be present. Incidentally the Guardian learned yesterday that Keith Boswall has been exhibiting at the fair continuously here for some thirty years.

Judge of the show was Raymond Brown of Dundas, Ontario.

Lively Competition In Scotch Shorthorns

There was keen competition and an unusual placing in comparatively small showing of Scotch Shorthorns yesterday at the Provincial Exhibition. The competition, for the most part, was between the herds of Athol Roberts of Southport of Southport and H. Lyle Boswall of Marshfield. The unusual placing was in selecting the reserve grand female championship and the battle was between these two breeders.

Mr. Roberts took the lion's share of the prize money with no less than eight red ribbons, to Boswall's four. But the Boswalls were tops in the championship winnings.

They took the senior and grand and reserve grand female ribbons, the junior male championship and reserve, and also the reserve junior female championship. Indeed it was the reserve junior champion that was placed reserve grand by Judge A.J. Hadden of Okotoks, Alberta over Mr. Roberts' junior champion.

The youngster that went Reserve grand was Tulloch Monarch Fashion Leader 2nd. She had been beaten in her class by Firgrange Lassie and she had been beaten in the junior championship class by the same heifer. Yet when the two appeared in the grand female championship class, the judge put the Boswall heifer up for the reserve grand ribbon.

That made it a mother and daughter combination for grand and reserve grand, as the grand champion was Tulloch Monarch Fashion Leader. She is the youngster's mother and they are also half sisters as both are sired

by a Deep Cove Scottish Monarch bull bred by Cyrus Eaton on his farm in Nova Scotia. One of the Eaton-bred bulls was senior and grand champion for Leigh Brown of New London. He is Deep Cove Scottish Monarch 5th.

The reserve senior and reserve grand male was Goldie Ransom owned by Mrs. Teekayde 4D that was reserve senior and reserve grand female. It was the first time she had been beaten here for the championship for many years. She has also been a winner of the grand at Amherst. A junior calf, Tulloch Charmer's Landmark, was junior champion for Mr. Boswall. His reserve junior was Tulloch Monarch Emblem.

Daniel Jewell of North River had a pair of red ribbon winners in the Shorthorn show.

Rye Is Grown Successfully

They have invited members of the government, APEC, and other interested people in Prince Edward Island to watch the harvesting of this grain and then to join them at a small reception at the Charlottetown Hotel.
