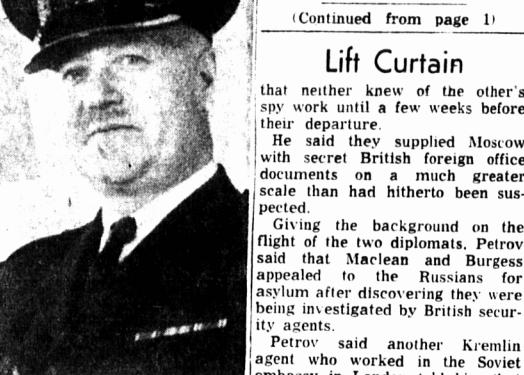
COULD INCREASE BUDGET

Report New Find On Mars

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Discovery of a vast new blue-green area, believed to be living vegetation, on the surface of Mars, was reported Saturday by the National Geographic Society.

The announcement said the discovery of this 200,000-square-mile area "has produced the greatest change in martian geography since the planet was first mapped 125 years ago."

The discovery was credited to Dr. E. C. Slipher, leader of the 1954 National Geographic-Lowell Observatory expedition which photographed Mars from South Africa.

The announcement said discovery of the new area, near Mars' great thorn canal, was "totally unexpected," adding: "It helps support the conclusion that Mars is not a dead world, that the darkening is due to the growth of plant life."
