Large Milk Powder Order From Mexico For PEI Firm

Island skimmed milk in powder form from the new Concentrated Milk Products Division of Central Creameries, Charlottetown, will soon be selling in Mexico. Seventy-five thousand pounds of it, the first installment on an order which may total a quarter of a million pounds will be shipped shortly to its destination in the south. It is said that it will be the biggest dairy order ever filled by an Island firm for export to a foreign market.

Three Injured In Marine Accident On Water Front

John Lund, Fred Somers and Robert Stanley are patients in the Charlottetown Hospital following a marine accident on the local waterfront at eleven o'clock yesterday morning. The three men constituted the crew of a Department of Transport, Marine Branch motor boat under Wharf Foreman Lund sent to assist in the refloating of the Rocky Point Ferry "Figueroa" which grounded on a projecting pile at the head of the old abandoned Connelly wharf, while being eased along the waterfront in a dense fog at 9 a.m.

Excavation work began recently at Montague preparatory to the erection of the new Federal building. A temporary halt was called a few days ago when interested citizens protested that the building apparently was to be flush with the sidewalk. It was felt by the observant folk that the building could very well be sited well back from the street, so that a parking area for cars, and perhaps even a stretch of lawn and some flower beds could be included in the general plan.

King's County in fact seems to be feeling the falling off in employment less than other parts of the province. About a hundred and forty people are presently employed by the Eastern Packers in Souris. Some of these are engaged at the company's filleting plant, or in connected work, while others are occupied in the canning of beef chicken, probably in November.

Will Observe Laymen's Sunday — National Laymen's Sunday will be observed tomorrow in the Church of England throughout Canada. In the deanery of Prince Edward Island special services will be held in most parishes under the auspices of the Laymen's Association.

Maritime Children's Work Board Meets — First meeting of the Maritime Children's Work Board to be held on Prince Edward Island next Thursday for an all-day session at the home of the chairman, Mrs. J. Gordon MacDonald. This board, a branch of the Maritime Religious Education Council, provides Christian leadership to 100,000 children of different denominations in the Maritimes.

Lecture At S.D.U. By Mr. Campbell — Mr. Roy Campbell, noted South African poet, spoke to a very appreciative audience at Saint Dunstan's University auditorium last night. The speaker, who is on a lecture tour of Universities throughout the Continent, was in Charlottetown at the invitation of the University. He spoke on conditions in the two countries of Portugal and Spain where he has lived for a number of years.

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Baritone Soloist Heard In Fine Concert Last Night

Charlottetown had a warm welcome for a promising young Canadian artist, James Milligan, baritone, who last evening opened the Prince of Wales College Concert series for the year with an enjoyable program of great appeal. Mr. Milligan, who sprang into prominence when he won the top award in the French network version of "Singing Stars of Tomorrow" three years ago has already become widely recognized in Canada's musical field, and is heard yearly with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and Mendelssohn Choir in the "Messiah."

Three Italian love songs dating from the 15th and 16th centuries followed, "Sebben Crudele" by Caldara, "Danza, Danza, Fanciulla Gentile" by Durante, and the moving and gentle "Tu Lo Sai" by Torelli.

The first half of the program was concluded with the dramatic meditative Credo from the second act of Verdi's "Othello," and the enthusiastic applause of his audience brought Mr. Milligan back for an encore, a pleasantly whimsical little song entitled "The Little Irish Girl."

A collection of three French love songs by Vaughan Williams and his "Silent Noon" and "The Vagabond" were followed by a group of captivating songs of a seafarer by the contemporary English composer Michael Head—"Limehouse Reach" "Back to Hilo" and "Sweethearts and Wives"—completing the scheduled program.

Mr. Milligan responded to demanding applause with a rendition of "Old Man River" which brought out all the pathos in this popular song from "Porgi and Bess," a lively interpretation of Moussorgsky's humorous "Song of the Flea," and Clarke's moving song of thankfulness, "The Blind Playman."

The richness and quality of his voice in every number, and his obvious grace made Mr. Milligan's presentation most enjoyable, and the audience responded enthusiastically to this young singer. His fine performance was complemented by the sympathetic accompaniment of his wife, Edith Scott Milligan, which was noticeable throughout and particularly in the "Credo."

Next Monday night other radio staff members will be with Mr. Rockwood for the special music. Charles Lambhead, radio engineer and announcer, will play his accordian and sing. Miss Beryl Grant, pianist on the broadcast, will play and sing. Other members will also be present for the special music.
