WHAT DOES IT MEAN?—It is reported that several prominent officials of the Civil Service of this Province have been given the title or rank of "Honorable" by an Imperial institution of England of which Her Majesty the Queen is Patron and His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales is President.

A DANGEROUS PRACTICE.—In the corridor of the House of Representatives, at Washington, on Saturday, ex-Congressman Taulbee was shot through the head by Charles Kencaid, a correspondent of the Louisville Times. The ex-Congressman had previously pulled the correspondent's nose. Taulbee is in a dangerous condition.

ELECTION PETITIONS.—Three election petitions were filed to-day with the Prothonotary of the Supreme Court. One is issued at the instance of John Drake, butcher, and aims to unseat Messrs. McLeod & Blake on the ground of bribery. Another is against Donald Farquharson and is signed by Donald McKay, Oyster Bed Bridge, and Alexander C. Shaw, West River. The third is sworn out by Joseph Wise, against Donald McKay.

THE AUCTION SALES already announced by E. H. Norton & Co., for the present month, indicates a business hum in their line. Some of the sales are large and important, especially to Farmers and Stockraisers. McKay, of New London, of Farm Stock, will give farmers in that locality a good chance to get bargains. The Eldon House and Furniture on March 24th is also an important sale.

BOSTON PRICES.—An official circular of the 27th ult., at hand this morning, says: Choice Eastern Rose and Hebron potatoes have been in light supply and are ruling a little higher than last week, with some extra Houlton Hebrons held at 78c. There is considerable call for choice eastern Rose for seeds. Choice Burbanks, Stars, etc., hold steady. Chenangoes are cleaning up fairly at from 58 to 60 cents. Magnums are in liberal supply and a shade easier, selling at \$1.60 to \$1.75 per sack as to quality. There is a marked increase in the arrival of eggs this week, and since Friday the market has been ruling in buyers' favor. Prices range from 14 to 17 cents. Mackerel are ruling considerably lower than they have been, but the demand continues light.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 4. In the House to-day Mr. Davies introduced a bill to amend the Franchise Act. The debate on the third reading of the Orange Bill was resumed. Mr. Laverne moved the six months' hoist, which was lost by 63 to 86. Mr. Curran's amendment was voted down by 23 to 124. The motions for the third reading were then carried by 86 to 61. Mr. Lester moved the appointment of a select committee to investigate the claims of Bressaylor half-breeds with regard to Northwest rebellion losses and alleged looting of their furs by military authorities. After considerable discussion, in which the Government showed that the Bressaylor settlers' claims had been fully dealt with by the rebellion losses commission, Sir Richard Cartwright moved in amendment that the committee be charged simply with the investigation of the charge of misappropriation of the furs. Sir John Macdonald said that the inquiry could not be consented while the suit just brought by Bremner against Sir Fred Middleton and others was before the courts, and he moved the adjournment of the debate to see whether that suit would be passed. This was agreed to. The house rose at 11.10.

British Parliament

LONDON, March 3. In the House of Commons to-night W. H. Smith moved the adoption of the report of the Parnell Commission. Gladstone moved the amendment announced by Morley of Feb. 24th, declaring "that the House reprobates the charges based upon the calumny made against members of the House, and while expressing satisfaction at the exposure made of evil doers, regrets the wrong inflicted and suffering and loss endured through those acts of flagrant inquiry."

A Guarantee that was Not a Guarantee.

MONTREAL, Mar. 3. The Guarantee Company of North America, who were condemned a few days ago by Justice Malhiotte to pay \$5,000 to the Montreal Harbor Commissioners for the default of Whitney, their absconding secretary, have carried the case to the court of appeal.

A Minister in Danger.

LISBON, March 3. Owing to the fact that Portugal has refused to withdraw the exequatur of Glyn Petre, the British Minister, students have formed a league, the members of which are pledged to assault the Minister.

The Number Saved.

LONDON, March 3. A despatch received this evening states that 158 of the passengers and crew of the steamer Quetta, lost on the way from Yokohama to London, were saved.

Anniversary Celebration.

ROME, March 3. To-day was the twelfth anniversary of the coronation of the Pope. High Mass was celebrated in the Sistine Chapel in honor of the occasion.

Episcopal Promotion.

KINGSTON, Ont., March 4. Bishop Cleary, who has become famous from his controversy with Hon. Mr. Meredith, has been made Archbishop.
