Flying Club Break Nets Jail Term

SUMMERSIDE — A Mount Pleasant man, Erin Edwin Essery, was sentenced to one month in Prince County Jail when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court this morning for sentencing in connection with a recent break at the Mount Pleasant Flying Club.

Essery had pleaded guilty to the charge at an earlier hearing.

In addition the accused was ordered to make restitution for the liquor taken in the break — eight quarts of liquor and six cases of beer — to the amount of \$75. In default he will serve an additional month in jail.

Ingham MacNeill of Kensington pleaded not guilty to a charge of leaving the scene of an accident and the case was adjourned to the evening of Feb. 4. MacNeill was represented by J. Melville Campbell.

A Wilmet Valley man, John Edward Lacky, was fined \$50 and costs on a charge of driving while his license was suspended.

For operating a vehicle insufficiently equipped Ralph Wentworth Brown of Summerside was fined \$10 and costs.

Darryl Gaudet of Miscouche was fined \$10 and costs for speeding.

Residents of Kinkora, Parkdale and Bonshaw were each fined \$20 and costs when they appeared on separate charges of unlawful possession of liquor.

(Continued from page 1) Healed her husband died of overwork after working for seven straight days for the post office at \$1.25 an hour. He worked during the summer for Rivard who had helped them financially and sometimes forgave them the rent on their house which he owned.

ALSO CLEANED HOUSES He had also cleaned houses to earn money and received as much as \$5 for doing a ceiling. She told Chief Justice Dorton her husband left her no money. He had never mentioned leaving Mrs. Rivard \$20,000. "I wouldn't have believed it," she said.

She said her husband was taking a lot of medicines—tranquilizers for his nerves, a syrup for bronchitis and pills for acidity—but had taken "no more than usual" the night before his death. Rivard testified she may have told his wife to get in touch with Willie Lamy and Roger Aubin for money for his bail he wouldn't have suggested Gagnon.

"Ovide was a tenant... I did not believe he had anything of value," Rivard said. "Financially he couldn't help."

WAS 'ASTONISHED' "I was astonished when my wife told me she had obtained money from Gagnon but I didn't ask about it."

Mrs. Rivard had told him she paid back the borrowed \$60,000 in September.

Lamy, alias William Leblanc and the third person with a criminal record to testify before the inquiry, said Mrs. Rivard paid him back \$17,000 cash Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

The money was part of \$25,000 cash profit he had made selling land for a golf course in Joliette county which he kept "in a hiding place."

Leo Rene Maranda, counsel for Lamy, Rivard, Mrs. Gagnon and other witnesses, said some people keep money at home "and this makes some of my clients very happy."

QUESTIONED SUSPECT Rivard said he questioned murder suspect Robert Gignac, a previous witness, at Bordeaux Jail Monday where both are confined.

He said Gignac "swore an oath on the head of his children" that he had never told Guy Masson that \$60,000 was available for the Liberal party election fund if Rivard's extradition was blocked.

Masson, self-styled national Liberal organization committee man, testified last week that Gignac had told him this and he had passed the information along July 22-23 to Raymond Denis, then executive assistant to Immigration Minister Tremblay.

Masson introduced to Mrs. Rivard by Gignac, said he took \$1,000 from Mrs. Rivard last summer to go to Ottawa to see whether Rivard could be freed.

WLD OF EXPERT Rivard said Gignac told him the "extradition expert" supposed to be working on the Rivard case was "only in the imagination of Masson as a way of making pennies easily."

After reading the letter to Tremblay, Rivard was returned to Bordeaux and there was no indication whether he will be called to testify again.

The witness scheduled for Wednesday is Raymond Rouleau.

Mr. Desjardins said the commission wants to find out whether Guy Rouleau tried to exercise pressures in Rivard's case.

He said it is of great importance to know exactly what were the links between Rivard and Guy Rouleau.

P.E.I. Gov't Requests Vocational Scheme Aid

Dr. George Dewar, minister of education, said yesterday he has presented the provincial government's request to the federal department of labor for increased aid to the province's technical and vocational high school program.

He said Labor Minister MacEachen promised to give the request, which is for 50 per cent of the costs of the program, "every consideration."

The province now receives a per capita grant of about \$40,000 on the program, and if the federal government agrees to the proposal, it would mean about \$200,000 in revenue for the province, Dr. Dewar said.

The program, which is part of the federal-provincial technical and vocational training agreement, covers any courses or programs of regular secondary schools, technical, vocational or composite high schools where the full-time courses have a minimum of 50 per cent of school time spent in instruction preparing for an occupation. This must include technical, trade or occupational practice and theory, mathematics, science and drawing.

In addition, co-operative training programs in which high school students spend a minimum of 50 per cent of their time on the job are also eligible for federal assistance.

Dr. Dewar said if the government decided to participate to the extent of 50 per cent in sharing the costs of all provincial technical and vocational high school programs, it would mean an annual cost to the federal government of between \$60,000,000 and \$100,000,000.

Businessman J. H. Morris To Contest Ward 5 Seat

A well known Charlottetown businessman John H. (Jack) Morris, 39, of 10 Waverley Court, City, last night announced his intention to nominate to contest one of the three seats in Ward Five in the forthcoming Feb. 15 civil elections.

For the past six years Mr. Morris has been engaged as a life underwriter and general insurance agent with the Charlottetown branch of the Canada Life Insurance Company.

All his adult life he has been very interested in civic affairs, and on numerous occasions he served on various civic committees, particularly those organized by the Charlottetown Junior Board of Trade of which he is a charter member.

In the early 1950's Mr. Morris was selected to present a brief to the Royal Commission on Transportation during his sittings in Charlottetown on behalf of the Prince Edward Island Board of Trade.

Among his many interests, he is a longtime active member of the P.E.I. branch of the Navy League of Canada, and for several years was the commanding officer of the local sea cadet corps RGSCC Kent. During World War Two he served both in Canada and overseas with the Royal Canadian Navy as a member of the former Royal

Canadian Navy Volunteer Reserve.

He is also one of the Island directors of APEC and secretary of the P.E.I. Historical Society. He is also a cubmaster with the club movement at St. Paul's Anglican Church.

Mr. Morris is married to the former Lois MacLeod of Charlottetown, and they have two children, Donald 16 and Elizabeth 5.

2nd Medium Battery, RCA Entered War 25 Years Ago

Twenty-five years ago yesterday the 2nd Medium Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, formed in P.E.I., left Charlottetown for service overseas in World War II.

The battery of around 150 men left by train for Halifax Jan. 26, 1940, and on arriving in the city, immediately boarded the troop transport RMS Aquitania and sailed the next day for Britain, arriving there Feb. 8.
