GEORGETOWN—The French ship, Pinta, due here yesterday from Gloucester, Mass., is reported to have encountered ice conditions in the Strait of Canso and at last reports was to sail Tuesday.

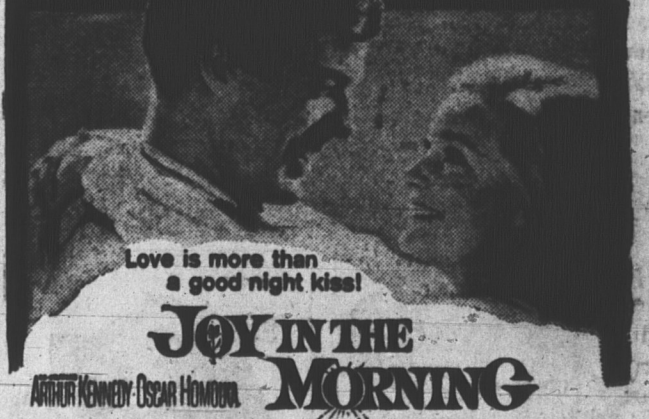

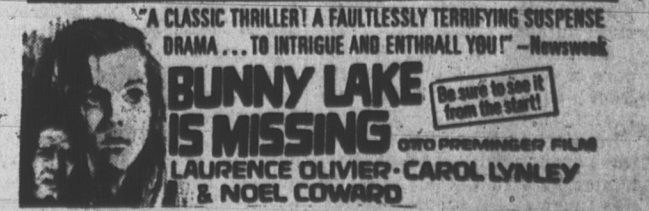

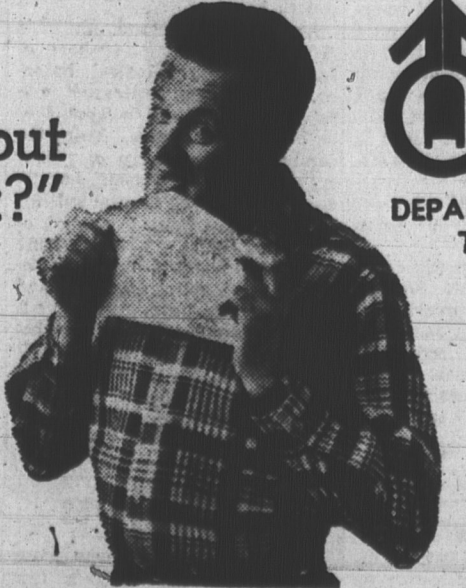
# Yipes! Is it April already?
