

The Halifax Presbyterian Witness says:—The meanness we ever heard of was done in P. E. Island. The people made presents to the Minister and then charged them against him, and robbed him of part of his salary besides."

Mr. ROBERT JENKINS, son of J. Jenkins, Esq., Ship-builder, was drowned at Little River, Lot 66, on the 28th of April, by the upsetting of a boat in which he and his brother were taking a sail.

GEORGETOWN celebrated the Queen's Birthday in good style. A military review, Royal salute, feu de joie, speeches and fireworks made up the programme, rejoiced the inhabitants of the capital of King's County, and testified to their loyalty.

STEPS are being taken by the Militia Officers of Queen's County, to retain Field Inspecting Officer Col. A. J. Douglas Smith, in his present position. An address to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor, to apply to the proper military authorities on the subject, has been prepared.

PRIVATE letters from the Western States report that the grain crop is looking finely, and that the weather is all that the farmers could ask. Fully one-third more wheat has been sown this year, than last, and the prospect for good crops was never better.

Mr. GEORGE PEAKE, of the firm of Peake Brothers & Co., of this city, had his leg broken in the hold of the barque Clara Noellea, on Wednesday evening last,—a bale of goods having fallen on him.

The degree of M. A. was conferred upon Mr. L. G. McNeill, of this Island, by the Edinburgh University, this spring. He also obtained a Gold Medal for superiority in Mathematics and Natural and Moral Philosophy.

The Marquis of Hastings having betted £100,000 stg. upon a recent horse-race in England, and lost, he committed suicide almost immediately after. This ought to throw a damper upon betting at horse-races.

SOME of our St. John and Halifax contemporaries are in trouble. The Halifax Citizen has been in Court and convicted of libel; the St. John News ditto, and the Journal of the same city is also in Court on a similar charge.

The steamer Emperor is now plying between Shelburne, Newcastle, Richibucto and Chatham. She does not touch at Summerside and Pictou, as anticipated. Summerside is in the dumps accordingly.

BUSINESS men complain of dull times in St. John, N. B., and Halifax. The Queen's birthday was celebrated with much eclat in both cities on the 25th inst.

R. T. HOLMAN'S brig, the Keewatin, Cole, master, from Liverpool G. B., arrived at Summerside on the 22nd ult., with a general cargo of merchandise.

DISRAELI BACKING DOWN.—A London despatch of May 20th says: "Disraeli writes to Mr. Gladstone that he will not further oppose the passage of the Church Bill.

The Yarmouth Herald says that the fishermen along the coast are doing well, cod and halibut being very plenty.

The Rev. Mr. Davis, of this city, lectured in Summerside last Friday, on the subject of Baptism.

The steamer Flamboyant, from Montreal, with 2,000 barrels of flour, arrived at this Port on Saturday last.

The Fall at Newcastle, Miramichi, received considerable injury by fire last week.

A Lot of City militia-men were fined before a Magistrate's Court on Monday last for non-attendance at drill.

An English paper says:—"The Catholics of Ireland are equally surprised and delighted at the great majority obtained over the Ministry. Most of their journals write sensibly and moderately about it; many of the out-and-out Protestant journals write, as may be expected, wildly. One threatens us with the shaking of the foundations of society; another observes that the indignant Protestant spirit of the land will yet rise in its awakened strength."

An amusing trial has taken place in France. It appears that at Rheims, where Madame Clignot, whose champagne is celebrated over Europe, resides, there is one M. Blondeau, a wine manufacturer, who, being an eye witness of the prodigious number of cases and bottles despatched to all parts of the world from the lady's storehouses, conceived the idea of finding out a widow of the same name, and making her a partner in his firm. He succeeded in lighting upon her, and actually persuaded another Widow Clignot to join him and enable him to restore his firm Veuve Clignot. The real original widow brought the case before the Tribunal of Commerce, and claimed exclusively the style and title of Veuve Clignot; but did not entirely succeed. A court of law, however, appreciated M. Blondeau's ingenuity in inventing his widow, with more severity, and decided that inasmuch as this second Widow Clignot took an active part in the management and operations of the firm of Blondeau et Cie., but simply gave it her name for the sole and obvious purpose of setting up an address title to which it had no moral claim, her name must cease to appear in connection with the firm of Blondeau et Cie., and condemned her jointly with Blondeau to pay the costs of the suit, and a sum of 30,000 francs damages to the Widow Clignot.

Senator Wilnot, when proceeding from Sir John A. Macdonald's residence, on Saturday evening, to his lodgings, was challenged by the security on passing the jail, and declining to answer was placed under arrest. After having been detained twenty minutes he succeeded in proving his identity and was discharged.—Ottawa Telegram.

At an ordination held at St. Mary's Cathedral, on Sunday morning, the Holy Order of Priesthood was conferred on the Rev. William J. Mihan, of the Archdiocese, by His Grace the Archbishop.—Ha. Express.

Dr. Parry, Bishop of Barbadoes, who is now in England, has resigned his see, making no fewer than five colonial bishoprics vacant at the present time. The bishopric is worth £2500 a year.

The large model of the International bridge between France and England is to be finished in about six weeks, and it is believed that this gigantic scheme will in reality be long carried out.

The barque Maitland, grain loaded, from Chicago, is under seizure at Detroit, charged with sailing under United States colors while being a British vessel.

The opening of the new docks at Sunderland, (England), will be attended by a squadron of French men-of-war and two or three vessels of the Dutch navy.

Cannibals continue in Algeria. French soldiers are waylaid, knocked on the head and made into broth or potted for future eating.

A seaman named John Jackson, a native of Ireland, jumped overboard from the brigantine Mary Olivia, on the 11th inst., while on the passage from Newfoundland to Glouce Bay, and was drowned. The body was not recovered.
