

Yankees Edge Cleveland Milwaukee Beats Brooks

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees shattered Don Mossi's no-hit bid with back-to-back home runs by Gil McDougald and Mickey Mantle in the seventh inning, then beat the sturdy south-saw with a pair of singles in the eighth Friday night for a 3-2 victory over Cleveland Indians.

Moss, a 27-year-old relief ace turned starter because of the Tribe's pitching injuries, had faced the minimum 19 men when McDougald walloped a 2-1 pitch into the left field seats with one out in the seventh.

Mantle allowed with his 29th home run of the season, crashing a 1-0 pitch into the left field stands to tie the score.

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CHARLOTTETOWN DRIVING PARK

Sees Joe O'Brien Win Big Event Before Record Crowd

Lt. Col. D.A. MacKinnon has just returned from a trip to New York where he attended a U.S.T.A. meeting and saw a big program of harness racing. He tells the story in his own words:

A meeting of the directors of the United States Trotting Association was held in New York last Wednesday night. On Thursday, we visited the newly built Roosevelt Raceway on invitation of the President, George M. Levy.

The air conditioning system makes temperatures very pleasant even on the hottest nights and the glass enclosed seating stands do not fog up, and the tract and horses and everything pertaining to it can be very distinctly seen.

When the fifth race was called, it was a three-year-old invitation race for a purse of \$15,000 with the winner getting \$7,500 and the owner of the winner the Governor's Cup. Eight horses answered the starter's bell and five of them were hunched when they hit the home stretch.

Then W. Averill Harriman, Governor of New York State, stepped out on the track accompanied by his aide and made the presentation of a magnificent trophy to Joe for the Camp Stable, owners of Razzie Dazzle.

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH The writer was a spectator at the Charlottetown track's race program Saturday night, and like the other upwards of 2,000 present, thoroughly enjoyed the fine program. The night was perfect and the racing exceptionally good.

Between dashes, we carried on a conversation with several fans, and one of them asked the question what our estimate of the crowd was, and we said about 2,000. Then the question came up, what was the largest crowd that ever attended a race meet at this track.

RACING HISTORY The management never expected the great throngs of people that would be their way to the exhibition grounds and race track. Some 14 Maritime newspapers carried ads advising visitors not to attend unless they had housing



provisions made, yet the large other losing little trotter, Christie attendance in the 55-year history of the Fair was present on Thursday afternoon. The total paid could be 3,883 persons. Practically all the available space was taken up, and for safety precautions, the RCMP closed the gates leading to the races at 1.45 p.m. It was an orderly, good-natured crowd that realized the circumstances of the day, and everybody wanted to take a holiday and seek some recreation.

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
