THE STOCK BREEDERS' MEETING.

AN idea of the vast extent and great importance of the farming interests of Canada has been brought home to us by the visit and speeches of Hon. John Dryden, Mr. Hodson, Mr. Courtney, Mr. Raynor, Mr. Robertson, Mr. Grisdale, and other gentlemen come to attend the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association meetings now being held in Charlottetown.

Mr. Hodson's description of the agricultural conditions, resources and needs of the country, from British Columbia in the West to Prince Edward Island in the East, given at the dinner of last evening, made clear the fact that the farming interests of the various sections of our immense country may be made mutually helpful and profitable. Mr. Hodson says our farmers may now and for years to come send large numbers of "stockers" and breeding animals to the Northwest, if only they have them to send. It has at all events been made evident in the discussions of yesterday and today that much is to be gained by the co-operation of the Agriculturists of these Maritime Provinces and the friendly intercourse of their breeders' associations with those of Ontario and the Northwest. We hope, also, soon to see a new movement towards improvement in our fine productions, followed by further efforts to place our products profitably upon the British markets.

The papers read and addresses delivered before the Association have been eminently practical, and the meetings must result beneficially though the stormy weather has prevented the gathering of large numbers of our farmers.

PARTRIDGES.

THE time being up for shooting these birds tomorrow, 30th November, we mention the fact lest some people might plead ignorance of the law.

The statute of last session makes every person who "shall have in his possession, or privately or personally vend or offer, or exhibit for sale any partridge between the 1st of December and the 1st of October, liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars for each bird. The only time these birds can now be had in possession is in the months of October and November.

We are satisfied this is a wise restriction. It prevents these birds being tracked in the snow, and so

destroyed in greater numbers than is advisable in view of the preservation.

We have a right to expect that all honourable citizens will observe this law; and have we not also a right to expect, that those who selfishly, or for gain, break it, shall not remain unpunishable? We call on those interested in maintenance of the law, our magistrates, police officers and constables, to do their duty, and so to do it that neither on the tables of the rich, nor in the dining halls of our hotels, can the law be openly and shamelessly broken.

A POINT TO BE NOTED.

PREMIER FARQUHARSON holds out no hope of improvement in the future, for he says:—

"Since I became Leader—two and a half years ago—I have done my best with the means at my disposal."

Having done his best, he cannot be expected to do any better. Electors who desire improvements for the future will not fail to note this declaration.

The Premier continues: "Whilst we have economized to the greatest possible extent, yet we have met the public requirements fairly well and have, up to date, paid every just demand made upon us, and for the past year carried out our promise to make revenue and expenditure meet, showing a small surplus."

The open letter to Premier Farquharson, which we publish to-day, deals with the deceptive financial statement contained in this quotation. The point that we desire to accentuate and impress upon the minds of electors is this: if the Farquharson Government—or the rump which remains after the turning out of Messrs Benj. Rogers, and J. R. McLean—should be returned to office and power, the business of the Province will be carried on in the future as it has been carried on in the past.

Compare the statement of Premier Farquharson with that of the Leader of the Opposition.

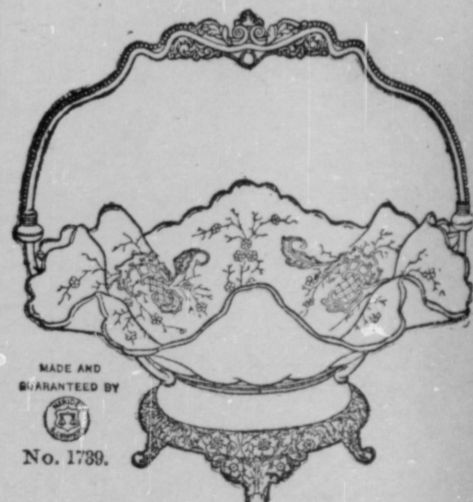
