A CNT spokesman estimates that when completed the telegram which will be delivered to the New Brunswick contender in his corner in the Montreal Forum, will contain close to 10,000 signatures. It will be over 100 feet long, showing the names of the signers and the various locations of origin.

The telegraphed expression of good luck from the host of Durelle backers in the seaboard provinces will easily be the longest message ever despatched by Canadian National Telegraphs.

LAST MINUTE TOUCHES ADDED

S'side Lobster Carnival Is Set For Gala Opening

SUMMERSIDE — The big countdown to carnival commencement this afternoon at Summerside saw preparations being rushed to completion. The town already assumes a holiday appearance with every hotel and motel filled to capacity and the overflow fast filling all available overnight accommodations in private homes.

Visitors to Summerside, many of them the families of firemen attending the Maritime Firemen's Tournament being held here in conjunction with Lobster Carnival Week, were arriving steadily yesterday along with carloads of holiday visitors from other Canadian provinces and many American states.

Later yesterday afternoon the Canadian destroyer H.M.C.S. "Cayuga" docked at the Maritime Wharf in Summerside, bringing 235 Canadian sailors to Summerside for the four-day carnival.

Last evening the east shed on the Marine Wharf was a scene of activity as the finishing touches were added to many of the floats that will be seen in Thursday's parade.

At the carnival headquarters in Summerside Stadium final trimmings and decorations were being added to the various industrial booths and exhibits. Other plans and details were all assuming their respective positions of readiness for the first day's program today.

Last evening, also, in many sections of the Island, the pretty contestants in this year's Lobster Carnival Sea Queen Contest, which includes more than 30 very attractive girls, were preparing for their first appearance this evening in the preliminary judging of these lovely girls, which commences at 8:30 p.m. on the stage in the Stadium.

Chimes and whistles will signal the commencement of the carnival at 1 o'clock this afternoon. At 1:30 the Lobster Carnival Little League playoff will begin.

Preliminaries for the Canadian Legion tug-of-war contest will start at 3 p.m.

The department of fisheries cooking school will hold their first afternoon session at 3:30. Lobster suppers will be served from 4 to 8 p.m.

The Bill Lynch show, will resume operations about 4 o'clock. At 5:30 the St. Leon Troupe will present their first feature act on a stage at the Stadium. The semifinals and finals in the tug-of-war contest will start at 7:30.

The carnival will be officially opened by Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., at 8 o'clock. The preliminary judging of the Princesses will start at 8:30. On Thursday the mammoth parade, featuring some 70 units, will begin at 3 p.m.

Live Animals Are Exhibit Feature

SUMMERSIDE — A fish and game exhibit at the Summerside Lobster Carnival Stadium will be the largest and most expensive ever seen on Prince Edward Island, according to fish and game officials. Due to the efforts of the Prince County Fish and Game Association, an interesting float will be entered in the big parade on Thursday afternoon.

While all kinds of live and mounted fish and game which are native to this province will be seen at the stadium, the two most special items are sure to catch special interest of all the children, as well as adults, who visit the exhibit.

Fish Cooking Demonstration To Be Feature Of Carnival

SUMMERSIDE — A cooking school designed to help the housewife develop new ideas and add variety to her present menu and methods of fish preparation will be one of the new feature attractions of this year's Summerside Lobster Carnival commencing this afternoon.

In charge of this cooking school is Margaret Myer, chief of the home economics section of the department of fisheries in Ottawa, assisted by Pat Smith, home economist with the fisheries department in Ottawa.

These fish-cooking demonstrations will be held in the carnival headquarters at Summerside Stadium commencing at 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday, and at 9 p.m. on Thursday evening, a change in time due to the big parade scheduled for Thursday afternoon.

About 70 housewives and home makers can accommodate at each cooking demonstration where the cooking of fresh, frozen, smoked, salt, and canned fish will be shown, in a menu of seven fish dishes in each hour-long demonstration featuring a different menu each day.

All of the dishes will be done in household-size recipes and those attending the demonstrations will be given free recipe books, and samples of the various

special attractions, which are very much alive, are two deer presently owned by a member of the fish and game association; Claude Harkness, of Summerside, and a cub bear which is owned by the members of the association.

Among the many other fascinating items in the fish and game exhibit are both live trout, and mounted trout, live beaver, skunk, ducks, wild geese, partridge, pheasants, mink, muskrat, hamster, squirrel, seal, quail, owl, eagle, hawk and many other mounted and live birds, animals, and fish.

On Friday another Requiem Anniversary Mass was sung by Father Bernard for Mrs. Theodora Bernard who was his grandmother and also the mother of former Lt. Governor Bernard and his brothers William and Frank and sisters Mrs. Gallant and Florence. She was the former Ann Perry who died in Tignish July 8, 1913.
