THE TEA TABLE.

A Collection of Interesting Items for Dessert.

NEW YORK and Chicago can both be held up as models in their growth of population.

According to the thirteenth annual report of the Chicago Board of Trade, Chicago contains now about 800,000 souls, as against 3,853 in 1840.

In 1840 the population of New York City was 312,710; at present it is in the neighborhood of 1,600,000.

Both New York and Chicago are admirably situated for a steady increase of the finest in the whole world, and as to Chicago, Lippincott's Gazetteer puts it correctly in stating that "one of the principal causes of the prosperity and growth of the city (of Chicago) is its position at the head of the great chain of lakes, which from the grandest medium of internal navigation in the world."
