By NANCY WHITE With a new subway system running beneath the St. Lawrence River and a cable-way swinging the motor darsing across the Jacques Cartier Bridge, just getting to the 1967 World Exhibition in Montreal will be an exciting experience. Six countries, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Morocco, India and Canada, have already indicated their definite decisions to exhibit, the city of Montreal is on the move to prepare the St. Helen's Island site, and a staff of 200 is now working on the planning. The exhibition promises to occupy a place of great importance in Canada's history.

Robert F. Shaw, deputy commissioner of the exhibition, who is on a coast-to-coast tour to inform the public about the fair, said at a press conference yesterday that the exhibition program is "pleased and excited" about the progress being made. "The master plan, layout of the exhibition, estimates, organization and procedures have all been submitted to the two governments (federal and provincial government), he said. "The plans have been improved and a meeting to discuss the best estimates is to be held soon, he said. A \$4,000 model of the exhibition site which was to have been on display here today has been delayed. However, Mr. Shaw had brought along maps and photos to illustrate some of the main features of the 600-acre site.
