FRIDAY, Nov. 14—The first American Bishop, Samuel Seabury, was consecrated by four nonjuring prelates at Aberdeen, in Scotland, the 14th of Nov., 1734. The Bishops of New York and Pennsylvania were consecrated in London by the Archbishop of Canterbury, 1787, and the Bishop of Virginia in 1793. The first Roman Catholic bishop of the United States was Dr. Carroll, of Maryland, in 1790.

P. E. J. PORK.—Mr. W. E. Page, who is about starting a meat business in town, has just returned from a trip to P. E. Island, where he purchased a large quantity of pork and poultry. A consignment of 20 pigs, weighing from 200 to 400 lbs., arrived here for him this morning; also a quantity of poultry. *Moncton Times.*

Brown, sailed for Boston on Thursday evening with a cargo consisting of 630 cases eggs, 190 barrels mackerel, 190 barrels and 250 bags of potatoes, 110 cases berries, 225 cases lobsters, and 25 bags sirnips. The principal business at the recent meeting of the Missionary Committee of the Methodist Conference, was to ascertain the amount of money raised in local missions, the salaries of missionaries, and the appropriation of the grant made from the Central Missionary Board of the Methodist Church of Canada. The amount apportioned to this conference for domestic missions was made up as follows:

 Removes..... 1,708
 Incidentals..... 75
 \$10,593
 This amount, when apportioned to the ministers, left a deficiency of only \$318 on salary, an improvement of \$50 per missionary, of whom there are over 40 in the conference, as compared with last year. The committee made provisions for missionary meetings in the principal circuits of the conference.

The bazaar in aid of St. Joseph's Convent last evening was a continued success. Over six hundred dollars were realized, and there are still a very large number of articles on hand. It has been decided to continue it this evening and to-morrow when the different lotteries will be held and the balance of useful and fancy goods will be sold at a great reduction. This evening there will be new attractions, and the City Cornet Band which discourses splendid music will be in attendance. An attractive feature this evening will be an election to decide the most popular public man in Queen's County. The election will be concluded to-morrow night. The names of our public men will be placed on a blackboard. Polling will commence at seven—universal suffrage. The ballot boxes will be opened every quarter of an hour from eight o'clock this evening. Ballots will be sold at five cents each—six for 25 cents. Ways and Means, etc.

LONDON, Nov. 12. In the Commons to-day, the Marquis of Hartington, secretary of war, moved an appropriation of £1,000,000 for the Nile expedition. He explained that the object of the expedition was to accomplish the relief of Gen. Gordon, but said Lord Wolseley was not precluded by the terms of his instructions, from establishing settled government over Khartoum and surroundings. In the Commons, the Marquis of Hartington read a telegram from Gen. Gordon, dated August 26 h, as follows: "Provisions for five months. Shall send Stewart to French and English consuls. Relieved Dongola after destroying Berber." The report that Gen. Gordon had been shot is not credited here. The information was communicated by Prime Minister Ferry.

News from Gordon.

ALEXANDRIA, Nov. 13. A government clerk from Khartoum has arrived here. He states General Gordon has made frequent attacks upon the Mahdi's forces and created great havoc among them. The Mahdi, he says, has ordered his troops not to kill Gen. Gordon if they have opportunity, but to take him prisoner if possible.

No Change to Note.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13. The official count so far does not materially change the result already printed. The result so far shows a net gain of 33 for Blaine which leaves Cleveland's plurality in New York 1,243.

Ministerial Movements.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13. Sir John has postponed the date of his leaving England to the 29th inst. Hon. Mr. Pope has returned from the Northwest.

Chiniquy Disturbances.

MONTREAL, Nov. 13. Three hundred men escorted Father Chiniquy home after his lecture last night. A riot is feared at the next service.

The Cholera.

PARIS, Nov. 13. Fifty-eight deaths from cholera have occurred since midnight, of which thirty were in the city; the remainder were in hospitals in the suburbs.

OTTAWA, Nov. 13. Mr. Allison, Liberal member in the Commons for Lennox, has been unseated for bribery by agents.

The Blind Postmaster-General.

To show what marvels Mr. Fawcett was capable of despite his loss of sight, the following from the pen of one who knew him well may not be out of place:—"In the very heart of London he has contrived to secure a modest house with a garden one-tenth of a mile long, where he can promenade all alone to his heart's content. He is never so happy as in the open air, and in his native Wiltshire his pedestrian feats have become almost proverbial. His topographical knowledge is so minute that when his guides are at fault he not infrequently directs them—from early recollections of natural objects of course. He religiously frequents the university boat race on the Thames, and is as heartily interested in the proceedings of the day as the keenest-eyed observer. At Cambridge he is stroke-oar of the 'Ancient Mariners' boat, and a better stroke or crew of 'mariners,' ancient or modern, need desire. He is a good swimmer. When the fens are frozen he takes to his skates as naturally as a duck in the water takes to her web. On such occasions his daughter, a graceful maiden of eleven winters, precedes her father, whistling playfully. He is likewise an ardent equestrian, and when in residence at the university seldom a day elapses that the professor of political economy may not be seen accompanied by some one of his numerous friends cantering fearlessly on Newmarket Heath or Across Flat. He occasionally even follows the hounds on a well trained scud, and so hard a rider is he said to be that the livery stable keepers have two tariffs—one ordinary for those who have not been seen in the society of Professor Fawcett, and one extraordinary for those who have. Add to this that Mr. Fawcett is one of the best and most indefatigable amateur salmon and trout fishers that can well be imagined, and it will readily be admitted that no great difference has overtaken him with regard to outdoor recreations."

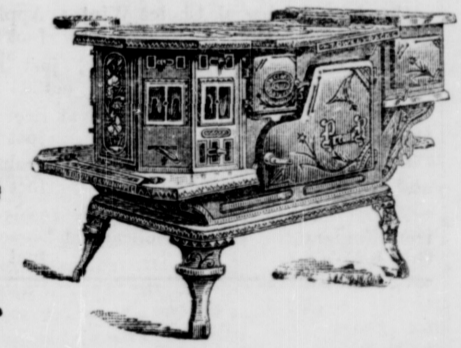
