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Let's Talk It Over

A Prince County Viewpoint

The Government instituted credit controls and raised income taxes to cope with our very serious inflation problem. They said that this was the sensible way to approach the problem and the ordinary man in the street, who knows as much about the intricacies of economics as a native of Java knows about constructing an igloo, couldn't do much else but take the Government's word for it. After all our Government could be right, and the United States Government which decided on price controls to fight inflation could be wrong. In any case, it was the fair thing to give our Government a chance to prove its point.
Then a few months ago the Government assured us that the inflationary spiral had reached its peak and a "levelling off" could be expected. We all hoped that this was true and waited. Just before the cost-of-living index for May was released and instead of the expected "levelling off" the spiral kept on its way upwards. This, coupled with the fact that the cost-of-living index in Canada had climbed three times as fast as it did in the United States since last January when price controls were instituted there, makes the man in the street a little uneasy about the wisdom of our Government's fight against inflation.
Increasing income taxes is at best a two-edged sword. If the edge whose purpose is to help fight inflation is too blunt to accomplish its ends, the other edge will certainly be keen enough to make it all the more difficult for the common man to make ends meet. During the last year our Government got as much credit for its winning fight against inflation as for anything else it did. It won that fight largely by putting on price controls. Whether our Government is wiser now and knows a better way to fight inflation remains to be seen. We're all from Missouri and still have to be shown. And we should like to be shown before inflation does incalculable harm to our children by placing prohibitive prices on the food sent to their growth and well-being. Surely we cannot be called over-impatient in this.
One thing is sure. This Government of ours is on trial for its life on this vital issue of inflation. The judge and the lawyers for the prosecution and defence may be the economic experts and politicians who glibly argue the case. The common man whose welfare is at stake. But the jury will render the verdict as those low income people themselves. They will throw overboard all the lofty arguments, pro and con and will give a plain "bread-and-butter" decision which everyone can understand.

Reviews Difficulties
An address was then given by Mr. D.A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board. He spoke about the difficulties encountered last year in marketing the potatoes. He said that 9,003 carloads were shipped with a value of about three million dollars. He spoke about the starch support programme and estimated that one million bushels of P.E.I. and New Brunswick potatoes were used. The potato average had been reduced about 30 per cent this year, Mr. MacDonald estimated. He added that the Marketing Board would endeavor to register every P.E.I. potato grower and farms for that purpose would be in the press this week. He spoke about the long range sales promotion work and mentioned the services of Allie MacNeill and Fred Bell, the two members from Prince County on the five member Potato Marketing Board.
A very informative address was then given by Mr. Leo P. McIsaac who had just returned after spending a year in England and on the European continent, studying various aspects and phases of agriculture. He was the only Canadian among a group from Commonwealth countries to take this course on a scholarship awarded him by the Canadian Association for Adult Education. He visited sections of the British Isles, France, Germany, Finland and Italy. He also studied economics as they pertained to farm production at Oxford University.
Mr. W.R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, was heard in a fine talk on the value of radio forums and the help they are to the farming population.

Resolutions
The resolutions committee brought in many resolutions and among these was one requesting that all potatoes exported from the Province be in new bags. This was adopted. They also adopted a resolution saying that increased freight rates had a strangulation effect on agriculture and that deficits on the railway should be met by increased taxation rather than freight increases.
The Mount Royal Women's Institute served lunches at the supper hour.

At 8.30 P.M. the sessions resumed and a very interesting story was told by Mr. W.R. Shaw "Europe As I Saw It".
Mr. Shaw held his audience spellbound as he told of his trip through Sweden, Norway, England, Scotland and Finland. He mentioned the democratic spirit of these countries and their fine folk school where culture, music and history are taught.

The next speaker was Mr. Charles Yeo, President of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture, who delivered an address on the overall work of the Provincial Federation. The final speaker was Mr. Louis O'Connor, President of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture.—S

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Prince County Federation Holds Successful Meeting

There was a splendid attendance at the semi-annual meeting of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture, which met in O'Leary Hall on Monday afternoon and evening.
The session opened with a meeting of the board of directors whose names are as follows: First district—Mrs. Erroll Stetson and Gregory McInnis. Second district—Mrs. Henry MacDonald, W. J. Dennis and George Shaw. Third district—Mrs. Arnett Simpson, Angus Gillis and Edward MacGougan. Fourth district—Frank Jardine, R. A. Profit, Mrs. Harold Leard. Fifth district—Innis Small, Mrs. Harold Linkletter, Charles Yeo.
The regular meeting then got under way with the president, Edward MacGougan presiding, and the secretary, Cyrus Poirier, reading the minutes. The resolutions committee was appointed as follows: Colin Waugh, chairman, Heber Profit, John Wallace, Burton Rix, Mrs. Perley MacNeill. The president then gave a fine report of the achievements of the Federation during the year, mentioning the part the Federation played in the Potato Marketing Board, the freight assistance policy, etc. He mentioned that four veterinary doctors had been appointed for the province. Two are stationed in Prince County, (one in O'Leary and one in Summerside), one in Montague and one in Charlottetown.

The Hon. C. C. Baker, Provincial Minister of Agriculture, was the next speaker. He complimented the Federation on their fine work and said it was a live wire organization and mentioned that the Provincial Department of Agriculture is always happy to co-operate with the Federation. He noted the country looked as well as it has ever looked from an agricultural standpoint.

O'Leary, Mr. Baker said, is a close second to Kensington as a shipping centre for agricultural products. He commended the fine spirit of the different Women's Institutes.

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Regular Meeting Of S'side Town Council

Mayor Henry W. Wedge presided last night at a regular routine meeting of the Summerside Town Council with all the councillors being present. Town paid bills of \$30,020.71 were confirmed and town unpaid bills amounting to \$4514.12 were ordered paid.
Electric light paid bills of \$487.88 were confirmed and unpaid bills of \$11,308.91 were passed on motion to be paid.
A bill for paving, by Morrison and McRae, amounting to \$40,388.56 was presented and on motion ordered to be paid.
The clerk reported that the sum of \$100.00 had been collected as a license fee from the "Hollywood Daredevils Show" who staged their performance at the driving park on Friday and Saturday nights.
Councillor Gorvill moved a resolution which was seconded by Councillor Sheen to authorize the town to borrow the sum of \$120,000.00 in current account and \$200,000.00 capital account from the Bank of Nova Scotia by way of overdraft, this amount to include the present overdraft existing. It was noted by His Worship that this authorization was required to finance until an issue of town bonds in 1952 was completed.

A brief report was submitted by Councillor Driscoll on the work being done in repairing the streets. Councillor Schurman submitted the monthly police report and Councillor Morrison stated that all was well at the electric light plant. Councillor Sheen stated that the new fire engine was now completely equipped and that the old Beaver and hand pump was pointed up for display purposes during the fire chiefs convention to be held here next week. He said that the new doors on the fire station would be installed in time for the convention.

Mayor Wedge said that the committee in charge of preparation for the convention had worked hard on the project and had about completed all the necessary arrangements. He exhorted all the citizens to cooperate and do all in their power to make the visit of the fire chiefs as pleasant and comfortable as possible.

Reporting on the work at the new playground, Councillor Sheen said that this work was progressing favorably. He referred to the recent vandalism at the high school when several panes of glass had been broken and he proposed that a more rigid survey of the locality be made by the police. He said that residents were complaining of the noise around the school grounds at night. Mayor Wedge stated that instructions had been issued to the police to keep a strict watch after nine o'clock for any offenders and said that an example would be made of anyone found guilty of these offences.

The Town Clerk reported that as at June 30th about fifty per cent of the town taxes had been collected.
