

Sign Dispute Is Set Aside

SUMMERSIDE — Taken down when a dispute arose as to which side of the building it should be on, the tony matter of the Summerside fire hall sign has been set aside until after the evictive election.

Councillors contacted Thursday and yesterday were willing to make any comments on the matter for fear of conflicting with the 10 a.m. of those who are campaigning.

The sign was constructed in such a manner to suit the canopy at the north end of the hall and it was originally placed at that position. Then after the complaints of two citizens were received the sign was removed, and a resolution in council of August 1962 had the sign re-erected on the west side of the building.

J. Clark, chairman of the firemen's committee, in a letter to Town Council, said in the original position and that council should not have made the switch at the request of a only two citizens. He said an attempt would be made to bring the backing of the town citizens in the sign placed at the north end.

Conciling Leo Wood, who says he does not remember the resolution that had the sign placed at the west end of the building, is now the indicator of the 'win' on the north side campaign.

President George A. MacDougall, Charlottetown, recently announced the third annual P.E.I. Dance Festival, comprising dancing and Gaelic singing, will be held April 18 and 19 and will be open to the public.

This year, entries for the 76-class festival must be in the secretary's hands (Mrs. William Wright, 123 Kent Street, Charlottetown) on or before March 14.

Two new classes have been added to the program this year that of Solo Tap — School of Deaf, and Group Tap — School of Deaf, included among the other classes of dances are polkas, square dances, national and novelty dances, Scottish ballroom dancing, ballroom dancing, step dancing, tap dancing, Irish

dance, solo ballet, and group and solo highland dancing.

United Maritime Fishermen Urge Continued Surveillance

Continued surveillance of packers and buyers suspected of participating in the illegal lobster fishery was urged at the annual meeting of the United Maritime Fishermen in Amherst, N.S., today.

The resolution followed an address by Ambrose Fitzgerald, chief protection officer for the Maritimes, department of fisheries. He said packers and buyers suspected of engaging in the handling and processing of illegally caught lobsters had been under 24-hour surveillance, which had been fairly effective.

A second resolution asked that lobster licenses be restricted to fishermen utilizing 50 traps or more, or to men actively engaged in the primary industries.

The inter-province fisheries coop would like to see the department initiate a program of research on the stocks and movements of herring, and also to help industry locate new markets for herring products.

Appreciation was extended to Hon. Howard Robertson, federal minister of fisheries, for his efforts to establish a "Bottle Limit" for use of Canadian fisheries, and for the co-operation of the provinces set up a national fisheries program of development.

PARIS FRENCH ROCKETEERS

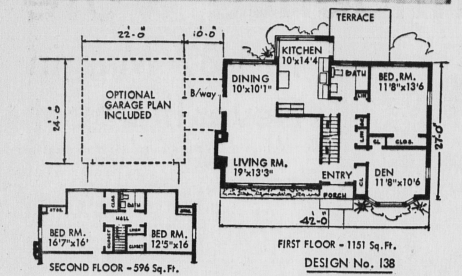
