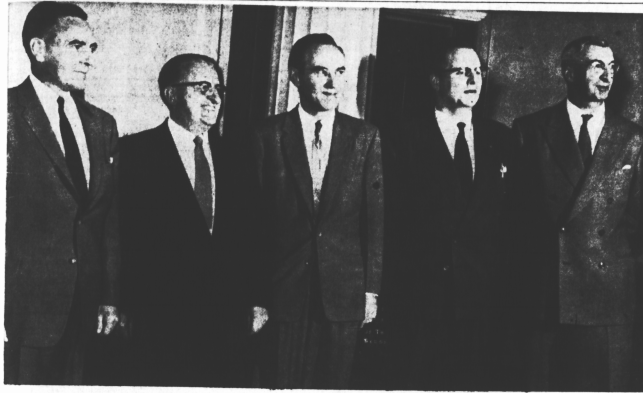

Two Gov't Backed Firms In Nfld. Likely To Fold

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Joseph Smallwood announced Friday that two more of the 16 government sponsored industries are likely to fold, and that he will not receive further financial assistance.

Britain Fires H-Bomb High Over Pacific In New Test

LONDON (AP)—Britain opened a new series of nuclear tests Friday by exploding a hydrogen bomb high in the air over the central Pacific about 2,600 miles from protesting Japan. The bomb was dropped from a Valiant jet bomber flying over Christmas Island, the coral atoll transformed into Britain's permanent nuclear testing base.

Still Hope For U N Compromise

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP)—The prospects for some form of compromise between the Soviet Union and the big western powers on disarmament were still regarded as optimistic Friday night. Reports earlier Friday that the Soviet Union and the United States were taking a second look at India's idea—which has been backed by Canada for a limited enlargement of the UN's working machinery on disarmament persisted although neither of the two big powers was commenting publicly.

House Decides Not To Hold Session Monday Morning

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons held a suggestion Friday that Nov. 11, Remembrance Day, be declared a national holiday. The suggestion came from Arnold Peters (CPC-Timiskaming) an RCMP veteran of the Second World War, who said every Canadian has some close friend or relative who died in the service of Canada.

The Minister has also accepted the invitation of city officials to take the salute at the Saint John cenotaph on Remembrance Day and will speak at a meeting of the Canadian Legion.

WIDOWS NOT HELPED

Widows of Newfoundland veterans who died before Confederation in 1869 were not considered war widows by the federal government and received no widow pensions. If a Newfoundland widow moved outside Canada, his Canadian veterans had been withdrawn and was left only with the small pension paid on the date of her husband's death. Earlier Capt. Walter Tucker (L—Rotherham), Liberal spokesman in the government, criticized the charge that the Progressive Conservative government backed out of a promise to raise pensions to veterans.
