THE PARK.—Although the roads through Victoria Park are now quite dry the Park has not yet been opened for driving. This is owing to the damage done to the breastwork last winter, and which has not yet been repaired.

ATHLETICS.—A meeting of all interested in athletic sports will be held in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Courtroom on Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock. All interested are invited to attend. The possibility of organizing an Athletic Association will be discussed. Let there be a good attendance.

A BAD STREET CROSSING.—The crossing on Weymouth and Water streets, near the Rail Stations, is a dangerous affair. It projects about a foot above the surface of the street, and the jolting which a carriage receives in passing over is most uncomfortable.

CHURCH PARADE.—Notwithstanding the cold and snow, there was a large parade of Old fellows to the Upper Prince Street Methodist church yesterday. At a quarter to eleven, the lodges headed by the citizens band, marched to the church, where Bro. Rev. Geo. W. Fisher delivered the discourse.

ODDFELLOWS NATAL DAY.—A large number of people went to Summerside with the Oddfellows this morning, to attend the Natal Day celebration in that place. The Citizens Band accompanied the excursionists. A grand concert in the Market Hall, Summerside, to-night, will bring the proceedings to a close.

TO AWAIT TRIAL.—A Rochester, N. H. despatch says that the coronor's jury has rendered a verdict that James McDuffee did murder Katie M. Lothrop, alias Kate Lawrence. On arraignment the respon ent pleaded not guilty and was ordered to Dover jail to await the action of the Grand Jury in September.

BOOMING SUMMER TRAVEL.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is making preparations for the summer travel, which the officials say will be the biggest on record from present indications. Seven sleepers have been sent through to Vancouver for the passengers from the Empress of India. Two monster excursion are already being arranged for parties of American tourists over the whole line to the Pacific. These take place in June and are to be followed by smaller parties later on in the season.

SHOOTING MATCH.—The semi-annual shooting for the medal presented by D. Ferguson to No 6 Co., 82nd Battalion, came off on the company's range, on Saturday, the 25th inst. The attendance was not large. The day was unfavorable for high scoring, as a gusty north-east wind blew across the range. Five shots were fired at each of the 2, 4, 5 and 6 hundred yard ranges. The best scores were made by Corp. Albert Shaw, Sergt. Readie, and Sergt. E. MacMillan. Corp. Shaw made the following scores at each range respectively: 12, 24, 25 and 21—a total of 82 out of 100 possible. The others followed closely.

GRAND EXHIBITION OF DRY GOODS.—On Saturday, at 1 o'clock p. m., sharp, Messrs. James Paton & Co. opened the doors of their large and splendidly arranged store and presented to the gaze of an admiring public one of the finest as well as the largest exhibition of goods ever shown in this city. Before entering the store our attention was particularly attracted to the beautiful and artistic manner in which the windows were dressed. In the east stood a bride, dressed in Bengaline white silk, with orange blossoms dotted, while the background was draped with feathers, lace and embroidery of all patterns. On the left of the bride was exhibited a fine artistic design of this, sufficient to say that it was made by the ladies of Notre Dame Convent, and will remain on exhibition for one week only. In the west window was tastefully arranged art muslins of all shades and patterns, while in the front stood two steel engravings, representing the shrewd house-weller and the unsuspecting purchaser. As the pictures are true to nature they attracted considerable attention. Entering the store we found we had to go one way, owing to the immense crowd. To particularize the different lines of goods shown by the efficient and obliging corps of clerks would cover too much space, we can only say go and see for yourselves. One point we particularly noticed is that Messrs. Paton & Co. have been the first to inaugurate these Saturday evening exhibitions, so as to give artisans and others who could not attend during the day, a chance to inspect their stock. Judging by the hundreds who visited it after tea, the firm should feel that their efforts have been highly satisfactory.

PRICE OF BREAD

The St. John Cotton Mills.

EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES.

St. John, April 27. The bakers here have advanced the price of bread to eight cents per loaf. For the first time in thirty years the employees in Parks Cotton Mill were not paid their wages on Saturday. Both the St. John cotton mills are in the hands of a receiver, and it is said that the Canadian Cotton Mill Combine is determined to shut them up, as under Judge Palmer's management they have been proving formidable competitors. As the Judge ordered the receiver to pay the wages, there promises to be some lively scenes in Equity Court this week. The hands go to work to-day as usual.

OTTAWA NOTES

Preparations for Parliament.

Ottawa, April 27. Hon. Mr. Carling has been called to the Senate. Hon. Mr. LeCote will be the Government candidate for Speakership of the Senate. Mr. Grandbois, M. P., is to be Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons. It is now said that Mr. Hasen, of St. John, will move the address, and that Caribou will second it. Notice of the introduction of 130 bills has already been filed. Last year only 71 were dealt with. The session may be a long one. Caleb Atkins is appointed commander of the government steamer Newfield. He was first officer under the late Capt. Galford.

Down on Parnell.

MONTREAL, April 27. Archbishop Fabre, of Montreal, has issued a circular to the Irish Catholics of this city exhorting them to keep away from Redmond's meeting to be held here in Parnell's interest. Father Dowd, of St. Patrick's Church, in endorsing the circular, was terribly severe on Parnell. The circular causes great excitement here.
