### SIR CHARLES ON THE SITUATION.

Speech at the Grand Banquet Given in His Honor at Ottawa.

In response to an enthusiastic toast to his health given at the banquet held at Ottawa a few days ago, Sir Charles Tupper said:

"I am sure that no language I can command can adequately convey to you a tinge of what I feel on the present occasion. I have had many opportunities of learning my indebtedness to the great Liberal-Conservative party of Canada. You have again and again testified in the most enthusiastic and effective manner your readiness to support me as the Conservative leader in discharging the great and important duties that rest upon the head of so great and distinguished a party. (Cheers) But I am, on the present occasion, more than ever deeply reminded of what I owe to you, and I only wish, gentlemen, that my ability to serve you in the high capacity to which you have elevated me and in which you have so loyally sustained me was at all adequate to what you deserve at my hands. (A voice—You are all right.) I have no hesitation in saying that if ever a leader had reason to be proud of the party that he had the honor to command, that leader is myself. I do not hesitate to say that in my judgment the Liberal-Conservative party never occupied a prouder, a more distinguished or a more important position than it occupies today. (Cheers.) In the face of difficulties of the most extraordinary and unexpected character, we were forced, a year ago, to appeal to the people, and although we triumphed to a large extent over these gigantic difficulties which were interposed in our way, it was our fortune to fail in obtaining the support of a majority of the representatives of the people, I must, however, remind you that if we failed on that occasion to obtain the support of a majority of the representatives of the people, we had the proud satisfaction of knowing that, at the close of the poll the Liberal-Conservatives had polled something like 19,000 more votes than the Liberal party. (Cheers.) You may tell me, gentlemen, that we have met with reverses at the bye elections. I do not so regard it. If you will cast your minds back to 1891 you will remember that after a desperate struggle our late lamented and ever to be remembered and beloved chief, Sir John Macdonald, simply obtained a majority of 25. As the result of the bye-elections which followed, the majority of 25 was in the course of a few short years swollen to a majority of 60. I give you that as an evidence of the immense advantage that a Government has in the bye-elections, and, therefore, that if reverses are sustained under those circumstances they are not of a discouraging character. But I also invite your attention to the fact that the Liberal-Conservatives having obtained 19,000 votes more of the intelligent electors than did the Liberals, and the party who are now in power, and who are wielding that power in a manner no other party in this country has ever done, who use every effort of terrorism, every effort of compulsion, and the most gigantic means of corruption ever before witnessed in the history of Canada, are unable today to point to one single man of standing, character or position who has left the ranks of the Liberal-Conservative party. (Loud cheers.) In the great province of Ontario you can turn to only two constituencies that have been contested with anything like a fair opportunity of getting at the unbiased public sentiment of the country, East Simcoe and North Ontario. (Cheers.) Those constituencies afford the evidence that there is no change against the Liberal-Conservative party in the public sentiment of this country. Go to the province of Quebec and the only election there which gave any opportunity of fairly testing the public sentiment was in Champlain. (Cheers.) There the Conservatives triumphed over the most gigantic corruption and the most desperate efforts that were ever employed to defeat a candidate for the Canadian House of Commons. (Cheers.) Go to the province of Nova Scotia. There we lost one of our party, who was unelected, but the seat was taken from us, under circumstances of extreme difficulty for the Liberal-Conservative party, with a majority of only nine, led by a gentleman who, within a year, has polled a majority of it of between three and four hundred as a candidate for the country to the local House. I give these as evidences to show that, although the Liberal-Conservative party met with reverses that could not be unexpected in view of the enormous advantage our opponents had when confronted with a party who had been continuously in power for eighteen years, we never occupied a higher, stronger, prouder or more promising position than we occupy today. (Cheers.)

WITH FACES TO THE FOE.

And I need not say that although we were defeated, we tell with our faces to the foe. (Cheers.) Not only that, but we stand today in the position of a loyal and constitutional Opposition, who in that most important capacity, are faithfully discharging to their country and party. Their duties. (Renewed cheers.) I feel confident that all that is necessary to insure our triumphant return to power at no distant date is to maintain that united action, to stand as we have stood since the hour of our reverse, shoulder to shoulder, prepared to do our duty to our country in whatever position in which we may be placed. (Loud cheers.)

Sir Charles reminded his hearers that although they had lost power they had not lost their principles, but could point with pride to the evidences of what the Liberal-Conservative party had under great leaders accomplished during the past eighteen years. Under the policy of protection they had erected monuments in the shape of great public works, which were not only a source of pride to every Canadian, but which would be regarded as evidence of the great power and usefulness of the Liberal-Conservative party by every

British subject throughout the Empire. Although the Liberal-Conservatives were defeated, the verdict against them was not on the great question of protection. (Cries of "No" and cheers.) Their defeat was brought about by false pretences. (He r heard.) The victory was won by a party who had one doctrine for one section of the country, and a different doctrine for another section of the country. False promises as well as false pretences contributed to that defeat. Let anyone who doubted that statement read the pages of Hansard.

Sir Charles went on to point out that the Liberals had paid the Conservatives the greatest compliment it was in the power of the former to do by imitating their policy. (Dr. Reid—Except in the matter of dismissals.) The imitations, although numerous enough, were not, however, up to life. (Laughter.) Take the National Policy. This the Liberals had denounced as one of the most ruinous things that could be inflicted upon any country, and they had threatened to unroot every vestige of it. Had they done so? No; the astounding statement was uttered by the Finance Minister during his budget speech that he did not propose to make any change in the general tariff, that he proposed to adopt the Conservative policy en bloc. (Cheers and laughter.) Let us then recall Mr Laurier's answer when questioned respecting the extraordinary resolution placed in the tariff, which declared that concession would be given to countries whose tariff on the whole was as favorable to Canada as the tariff of Canada was to them. Mr Laurier was asked what country's tariff this resolution would apply and his reply was that having searched the whole world over, from pole to pole, they found that only Great Britain and New South Wales came under the operation of the clause. The Government had to accept the National Policy which they had been denounced for eighteen years. (Cheers.) Take the Fast Atlantic service. This was a question to which the late Government attacked the most vital importance. It was denounced, however, by a member of the present Government who desired to see a seventeen knot service only inaugurated, and during the general election efforts were made, notable in the back settlements in the province of Quebec to persuade the people that the project would work great injury to Canada. Now, the Liberals have adopted the Conservative policy, declared, he, and he hoped they had good grounds for the statement that they had accomplished the service of \$250,000 less than the late Government had induced Parliament to vote. It was unnecessary to say that the Conservative Government never asked for a vote of \$750,000 in aid of the service until they reached the conclusion that it was impossible to provide it for less. When it was found that the \$750,000 per annum would not be sufficient to obtain the requisite financial support for the project, he (Sir Charles) induced Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, to give the pledge that Her Majesty's Government would contribute one half the amount that Canada would require to pay in order to establish the service. If, therefore, the Fast Atlantic policy should be crowned with success and a saving of \$250,000, it was because it had been rendered possible by the aid which had been obtained from the Imperial Government through the efforts of the members of the Conservative party. (Cheers.)

Still another example of a servile imitation of the Conservative policy was afforded in the expedition to be despatched to the navigability of Hudson's Bay. Sir Charles protested in the most vigorous manner against opening up the industries of Canada to German and Belgian competition, which the reciprocal clause in the tariff involved, and he also denounced, in unmeasured terms, the wholesale dismissal of public servants, tending as it undoubtedly did to the ruin of the civil service. Preferential trade, real and not bogus in character, was another subject upon which he touched, and in this regard he reminded his hearers how truly his predictions that the Government would be forced to recognize the existence of the German and Belgian treaties had been verified. He reaffirmed his conviction that the Government could have taken no more effective means of rendering preferential trade between Great Britain and Canada and the sister colonies impossible than it had adopted.

In his closing remarks he replied in graceful terms to the expressions of esteem contained in the address which accompanied the presents of the conservative senators and members on the occasion of the anniversary of his golden wedding. He spoke eloquently of his indebtedness to Lady Tupper and the happy married life they had spent.

HIGHWAYMEN IN NOVA SCOTIA.—Amherst Press: A report of a most daring attempt at highway robbery on the road between Apple River and Shulce, reached town Thursday night. A man named Green, of Springhill, who does a peddling business in the western section of the county, was driving a team along the road between these points when two men sprang out of the bushes and stopped his team. One went to the horse's head, while the other called Green to deliver his watch and money. Green struck his horse with the whip and the animal sprang forward, threw the highwayman off and went at a fast rate along the road. When a short distance from him one of the men fired a revolver at Green and the bullet struck him in the leg, making a wound which bled profusely. The wounded man managed to get to a house where assistance was secured to stop the bleeding and he was driven to his home at Springhill. Green is resting easy but is very weak from loss of blood.

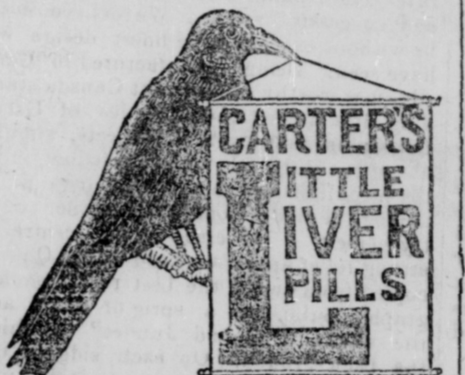
### Dose the Horn Fly.

You ask your readers what they are doing to rid their dairies of the pestilent Texas horn fly. Until the present season it has been up hill work with me to prevent the myriads of these tormentors from having their own way, but, thanks to the kerosene sprayer, the battle seems won, for with it one can destroy them on a herd of 30 cows in three minutes or so and not use more than one gill, and a half grown boy can do the work as well as a man.

The article is simply a half pint cup, half covered on top, with a round tube, one-eighth of an inch in diameter, passing through the covered side of cup near the edge and soldered fast, extending down near the bottom of cup and a little above the top. Across the top is soldered a flat tube, some 10 inches long and tapering, one end an inch wide and the other one-fourth or five-sixteenths of an inch and placed against the top of the small tube. With this the operator stands behind the animal (on one side) and with a single blast sends a cloud of spray lengthwise. He then serves the other side in like manner, and the job is done and the cow freed from her tormentors, which die almost instantly.—James Bullis in Hoard's Dairyman.
