

Ottawa Opposes Calls To Take Troops Home

OTTAWA (CP)—The government is firmly rejecting growing demands by the New Democratic Party and some Conservatives for the withdrawal of all or some of the 11,500 Canadian troops in Europe.

But government spokesmen concede that such demands would be difficult to resist if the United States began cutting its troop strength in Europe.

A Washington press report this week said nearly half the U.S. Senate would support a thinning out of the six American army divisions in West Germany.

Defence Minister Hellyer told the Commons defence committee May 12 that "I have no doubt that what one country (Canada or the U.S.) decided to do might have some influence on what the other would eventually do or be under pressure to do."

External Affairs Minister Martin has said Canada has no intention of reducing the effectiveness of the 6,000-man infantry brigade or 5,500-man RCAF air division in Europe.

Mr. Hellyer has said there are enough CF-104 jet bombers in the air division to keep it going for at least five years.

He told the defence committee: "We will have to continue to maintain an effective force there (in Europe) as our contribution for some period to come."

He said one of the principal reasons for this policy is "a demonstration of the political solidarity of the alliance."

Other defence officials have suggested that the real but unstated reason for the continued presence of NATO forces in Germany is to prevent Germany from taking national command of its military formations which now are under NATO command and eventually acquiring nuclear weapons of its own.

Douglas Harkness, former defence minister is not among those Conservatives seeking military withdrawal from Europe.

Hebert Smith, a Conservative from the Ontario riding of Simcoe North, suggested that Canada can maintain a presence in Europe while bringing most of its troops home.

Mr. Hellyer rejected the suggestion.

But Mr. Smith drew from Mr. Hellyer an admission that it costs more to maintain troops

importance of the psychological effect of our troops in France or in Germany.

Harold Winch, MP for Vancouver East and the NDP chief spokesman on defence, suggested there is a contradiction between keeping troops in Europe and establishing a mobile command in Canada capable of going anywhere in the world quickly.

Mr. Hellyer said this capability is designed to augment Canadian forces in Europe in an emergency, not as a substitute for those forces.

Government Will Increase Language-Training Effort

OTTAWA (CP)—The government has approved a 100-per-cent expansion of its two-year-old language training program to meet demands for bilingual civil servants.

Officials of the Civil Service Commission said here they will open five "language" schools in various bilingual cities next September. They will be located where the demand is found to be greatest in a survey to be taken in the next few weeks.

The commission already operates five full-time language schools in the capital area with a staff of 112 and a university-size enrolment of nearly 2,200 volunteer civil servants.

Total enrolment is expected to double for fall classes. The teaching and supporting staff will more than double to 250.

Civil Service Commissioner Sylvain Cloutier said in an interview the language program has been unexpectedly successful. It started in February, 1964, as an experiment involving 42 pupils and four teachers.

Today, about 1,900 English-speaking civil servants are completing intensive courses in French and 212 French-speaking advanced courses in English diction and composition.

Another 1,300 government officials in the Ottawa-Hull area lined up for courses last fall but had to be turned away for lack of accommodation.

Many civil servants in bilingual centres outside Ottawa have expressed interest in the courses and most of the five new schools are planned for them.

Another feature being introduced in September is a plan under which approved volunteers in smaller centres will take language courses in private institutions at government expense.

The entire program is expected to cost \$3,000,000 during the next academic year, double last year's figure.

Irish Director Being Honored

OTTAWA (CP)—Sir Tyrone Guthrie, outstanding Irish theatrical director, will be received as honorary fellow of the Royal Architectural Institute of Canada at its annual meeting Saturday in Jasper, Alta.

Also honored will be Morris Ketchum Jr., president of the American Institute of Architects.

Retailing Status Low For Career

TORONTO (CP)—Retailing has a low status as a career and frequently it is deserved, J. A. English, personnel superintendent of the Hudson's Bay Co., says.

He said at the annual conference of the Retail Council of Canada that the industry isn't providing appealing career opportunities for university and technical school graduates.

The industry was "just not competitive" in hours of work, rates of pay, working conditions, initial work assignments and fringe benefits.

The average rate paid to commerce and business administration graduates hired in 1965 for industry in general was \$45 a month. The average paid by retailers was \$422.

"Should we expect top-grade people to work at \$23 a month less than the average rate?"

U.S. Steel Corp. Increases Prices

NEW YORK (AP)—U.S. Steel Corp. has raised prices by \$2 a ton on cold-finished carbon and alloy steel bars.

The move apparently follows similar unpublicized price moves within the last week by Republic Steel Corp. and several smaller steel companies.

The boost on cold-finished bars comes less than two weeks after \$2-a-ton increases on hot-rolled bar products.

The bidding: Opening lead—five of hearts. If you attempted to predict the probable result after looking at all four hands in this deal, it would be difficult to escape the conclusion that South must go down one (possibly two) against the opening lead of the five of hearts.

East could be expected to win the heart with the ace and return a heart to the king, after which South would immediately or eventually tackle clubs and go down one or two, depending on how he played the clubs.

However, when the hand was actually played, the declarer (R.
