STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.—A heavy thunder and lightning storm passed over portions of New Brunswick on Saturday. It ripped off the plaster in its path and finally tore away a door casing. Mr. and Mrs. McDonald were absent from the house at the time.

CHILD DROWNED.—A little eleven months old child of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Kelly, of Long's Creek, York County, N. B., came to a very sad end on Thursday afternoon of last week. Mrs. Kelly went out berry picking, leaving the child, which was just learning to walk, in charge of her ten year old daughter. Along towards evening the latter left the child sitting on the kitchen floor, while she went to the pantry to get it something to eat. During her absence the little one got up and going over to a large butter tub, which was standing in one corner of the room partially filled with water, accidentally tumbled into it head foremost. When the little girl returned a few minutes later, the child was nowhere to be seen. She made a hasty search and in a short time was horrified to find her charge curled up in the tub with its head and shoulders under water. She extricated the unfortunate infant from the tub, but too late to save its life.
