Scientific Temperance

Discussed by the Teachers' Provincial Institute.

Debate on Mrs. Phillips' Paper.

(MR. OXENHAM'S REPORT CONTINUED.)

Mr. J. D. Seaman—This is the first time this subject has been taken up by this Institute. Although I would oppose as much as any member present the introduction of matters that do not strictly belong to our work as a Teachers' Association, I most gladly welcome Mrs. Phillips' essay.

Mr. A. D. McDonald, Summerside, seconded the motion and said: I quite agree with what has been said by Mr. Seaman respecting the paper just read. I believe that Scientific Temperance should come into the school in connection with the subject of Physiology.

Mr. N. McLeod, S'side, agreed with his colleague, Mr. McDonald, and said: I am thoroughly of opinion that temperance and physiology should be taught in school in the same lesson. I have done something already in this direction, but I would like to do more.

Mr. A. D. Fraser—I am greatly pleased with what has been said by those who have spoken on the question before us, and the deep interest they have taken in it.

Mr. J. K. Ross—It is a matter for deep regret that intemperance has become so prevalent in our country. The only way to overcome it is to educate the rising generation in temperance principles.

City Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. The absentees were Councillors Morris, Douse and Taylor.

Mayor Haviland presented a memorial from certain residents and property owners of Easton Street, between Great George and Prince, asking that a new plankway be put down on the south side of that street.

Councillor Hughes moved that the prayer of the petition be granted. Seconded by Councillor Horne.

Coun. Crabbie asked how the finances were. He did not want to stand in the way of these people getting the platform asked for—but it would be well to ascertain how the finances were before taking a vote on the resolution.

In accordance with this request, the Clerk submitted a statement showing the expenditure on streets and for macadamizing up to the 12th Oct. inst.

Councillor McCarron moved in amendment to Councilor Hughes' motion that no new platform be put down at present.

A memorial from the Fire Department, explaining that Galbraith's Band has been elected honorary members of that body, and asking that they be allowed the use of the spare room in the City Building to practice in, was referred to a special committee.

Henry Sellers' memorial, asking that the rent of the city scales be reduced because of a decrease in the receipts owing to a shortage in the hay crop last year and the fact that much of the produce coming in from the country was weighed on other scales, was referred to the Recorder.

A letter to Councilor Hughes in reference to the renting of Market Hall for the Rev. George Kent to speak in on Sunday the 25th Oct., and Sunday the 1st November, was next read, Councilor Hughes declining to take the responsibility of letting the hall without the consent of the Council.

Councillor Hughes was instructed to let the hall at the usual rate.

The letter of Lt.-Col. Irving, President of the Provincial Rifle Association, asking that the Board make a grant towards this year's prize list.

Councillor Crabbie gave notice that at next meeting he would move that the sum of \$50 be granted the Association.

It having been reported to the Board that some of the alarms in firemen's houses were not working well, the Clerk was ordered to write Chief Engineer Large, instructing him to attend to the repairing of the alarms at once.

The City Auditors were each voted \$75, back pay for auditing the accounts of the Water Commissioners for the years 1877, 1878 and 1879.

Councillor Beer informed the Board that the heating apparatus in the City Building was not in good working order, and moved that the Finance Committee be instructed to have it inspected and put in thorough working order at once.

Meeting adjourned.
