Ottawa Notes.
OTTAWA, M. y 18.
The estimates will be tabled to-day as arranged.
15,087 more petitions were presented this session than during the whole of last session.
The appointment of Andrew A. Macdonald to the Senate was gazetted on Saturday.
Sir John Macdonald attended a Council meeting on Saturday, and gave a dinner party in the evening. He is all right again and in excellent spirits.
Laurier expects to resume his seat to-day.
Sir Edward Kenny Dead.
HALIFAX, May 18.
Sir Edward Kenny died here on Saturday, aged 91.
Sir Edward was born in Kerry, Ireland, in the year 1800. He came to Halifax in 1824. He was for upwards of sixty years a leading representative of the Roman Catholics of Halifax, and was called to the Privy Council of Canada in 1867, appointed Administrator of the Government of Nova Scotia in 1870, and knighted in 1872. He has lived in retirement for several years past.
In Chase of the Itata.
NEW YORK, May 18.
The American warship Charleston, and the Chilean man-of-war, Esmeralda, are both lying in Acapulco Harbor. Formal interview took place between the captains on Saturday. The Esmeralda captain declared that the Charleston should never take the Itata until the Esmeralda was sunk. The American captain replied that he would capture the Itata despite the Esmeralda. It is believed the Itata has effected her escape.
A Warlike Article.
LONDON, May 18.
The Paris Republic Francaise has a warlike article on England in Egypt. It contends that the French Government should reverse the preparations to destroy what is left of French influence there and says that the Chamber of Deputies and the country are willing to grant whatever is necessary to vindicate the rights of France.
Another Murder.
NEW YORK, May 18.
Another murder mystery has been discovered in this city, the body of a woman washed ashore at Staten Island with a heavy stone attached to it. It was identified as the body of a wealthy dress maker. There is no doubt but that she was murdered.
The Two Factions Fight.
DUBLIN, May 18.
A collision yesterday at Kanturk, County Cork, between McCarthyites and Parnellites, resulted in many being seriously wounded. Numerous arrests have been made.
The Jews Must Go.
ST PETERSBURG, May 18.
The Russian Government has ordered immediate steps to be taken in all the Provinces for the removal of the Jews to quarters where they are permitted to reside.
The Storm in England.
LONDON, May 18.
The sharp frosts and storms of sleet and snow which prevailed in England on Saturday largely injured the fruit crops.
The Czarwitsch's Trouble.
LONDON, May 18.
It is now stated that the Czarwitsch was himself to blame for the recent attack on him in Tokio.

LONDON, May 18.
The Duchess of Fife gave birth to a daughter on Sunday, and both are now doing well.
