

U.S. Senate Gives Approval To Campobello Island Park

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Senate has given final congressional approval to the establishment, jointly with Canada, of an international park on Campobello Island, N.B., where the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt had a summer home. The Senate, acting on a request of Senator Edmund S. Muskie (Dem. Me.) substituted a House approved bill for the Senate measure in order to speed enactment of the legislation. The House bill was sponsored by Representative James Roosevelt (Dem. Calif.) and Clifford G. McIntire and Stanley R. Tupper, Maine Republicans. The similar Senate measure was tabled by Muskie and Senator Margaret Chase Smith (Rep. Me.). As set in the White House, the bill provides for a six-member international commission empowered to accept the property as a donation and to administer it as an international park. An offer to donate Roosevelt's former home and 10½ acres of land has been made by the present owners, members of the Hammer family of New York and California.

Montreal Harbor Water Level Low

MONTREAL (CP) — Water levels in Montreal harbor were down 34 feet, six inches Tuesday, a low point that had not been expected until mid-August. John Sylvester, assistant chief engineer with the St. Lawrence River ship channel, said an "iron seal" watch is being maintained on gauges in Montreal and Lake Ontario. He said there is possibility engineers may have to use water storage supplies waxes sooner than anticipated. But the best predictions indicated that there was enough water in storage in Lake Ontario to carry shipping right through December.

CUBANS ASK ASYLUM

CORFU Ionian Islands (Reuters) — Eight young Cuban stowaways on board the 7,200-ton Greek freighter Irena have asked authorities here for political asylum, a harbor spokesman said Tuesday. The source said the Cubans hid aboard the ship when it loaded sugar at Havana. The stowaways were handed over to the harbor master when the Irena put in at Corfu Monday.

BEATS NO-CONFIDENCE

TOKYO (AP) — Premier Hayato Ikeda Wednesday won the first non-confidence vote brought against him since he took office in July, 1960. By a vote of 270 to 164, Ikeda's Liberal Democratic cabinet defeated the censure motion introduced by the Socialists and Communists after the government party shelved bills permitting ratification of an International Labor Organization convention concerning freedom of association.

Heart Patients Claimed Better On Active List

VANCOUVER (CP) — Lumberjacks, coal miners, steelworkers and stowaways can recover from heart attacks and go back to work, a cardiologist told Canadian doctors here. In fact, heart patients have a better chance of long life if they remain physically active. Dr. Herman K. Hellerstein, assistant professor of medicine at Cleveland's Western Reserve University, said he spoke on the basis of about 5,000 tests made in clinics known as "work classification units." Of these, 87 per cent were returned to work, and not one of them properly checked and placed had died on the job. Dr. Hellerstein told the annual convention of the Canadian Medical Association that the heart patient who gives up and lies around home tends to get dissatisfied and fat with a good chance of having another attack. He said the average housewife works as hard, or harder, than her husband, "but the growth of labor-saving devices and appliances is lessening the

Himman, Alberta provincial treasurer said here. "Only the ignorant or opinionated harbor the erroneous opinion of value of housework in preserving health."

that there is anything inferior in the training, improvement and refinement of minds, morals and taste in the province of Quebec," he told a closed national conference on problems of Canadian unity. In a working paper on the role of the English provinces in relation to the federal government and Quebec, Mr. Himman said every opportunity should be given to Canadian school children starting in elementary school to make French a second language. "But I should warn that to attempt to legislate bilingualism or multi-lingualism will arouse antagonism which will be anything but unifying," he said. G. R. Davy, professor of political science at the University of Alberta, suggested in a paper that mass media in Canada should have more Canadian content, even if massive government subsidies and restrictions were necessary. MUST KNOW MORE For if we are to survive as a nation, it is vital that residents of Alberta should know

a great deal more about Quebec and the Maritimes, for example, than they do about Cyprus, Laos or even Washington, D.C.," he said. Dr. Eugene Forsy, research director of the Canadian Labor Congress, said French Canadians often raised the hackles of their English-speaking counterparts in the Canadian constitution. He said the British North America Act, basis of the constitution, envisioned a centralized union and provided only limited bilingualism and biculturalism. About 20 French-speaking Canadians were among the 45

participants in the conference, which ends today. All discussion was in English.

Kid Gavilan Said Prisoner

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Former world welter weight boxing champion Kid Gavilan of Cuba is reported a prisoner in Cuba. Gavilan said Tuesday Gavilan was arrested three months ago while preaching in Marianso, Havana suburb. They said that after retiring from the ring he became active in the

Jehovah's Witnesses. Francisco Villa, head of the teachers anti-Communist front, an anti-Castro organization, quoted Cuba's underground sources as saying Gavilan is serving a five-year term in Havana's La Cabaña prison on charges of conspiring against the regime.

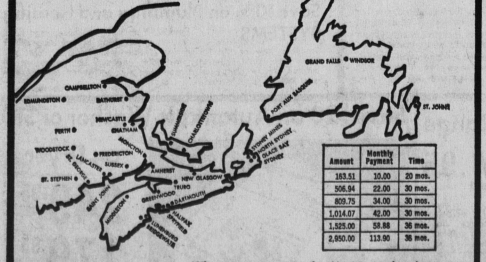
