A Terrible Riot.

MATAMORAS, Mexico, Aug. 8. A terrible riot occurred at Tlas-Palmas yesterday, between American and Mexican railroad laborers. Seven were killed, and three others fatally and ten seriously injured.

MacDermott Secured.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 8. James MacDermott was arrested here whilst landing from a steamer which had just conveyed him from New York. He was arrested on the charge of being an accomplice in the Cork dynamite plot.

Cholera in Egypt.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 8. There were 13 deaths from Cholera among the British troops in Egypt on Sunday, for last twelve hours there were only 30 deaths in Cairo. There were nine deaths in Alexandria on Sunday.

A motion made by a leading Conservative attacking the policy of the Government with reference to South Africa, was defeated in the Commons yesterday.

The Telegraph Strike.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8. Officials of the Telegraph Company say the cable box at the Company's cable was destroyed last night and cables cut. Also that twenty-six out of twenty-nine Mutual Union wires were rendered useless, and the American Union, and Atlantic and Pacific routes to Boston were interrupted with the evident intention of preventing the Boston papers from getting full reports of the Sullivan-Slade affair.
