Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, Dec. 7.

The writ for Cauberton's habeas corpus issued on Monday 19th inst., election 26th inst. Major Dogherty, of Charlottetown, has been appointed Superintendent of Stores and District Paymaster for the Island district.

The Order in Council respecting trout fishing has been repealed, and an order substituted providing that no one shall at any time fish for, catch or kill trout by other means than angling with a hook and line.

The C. P. R. Company will apply to Parliament next session for an Act conferring additional power for the construction and protection of its telegraph line.

The Congregational Foreign Missionary Society gives notice of application for incorporation.

The revenue of Canada for the first five months of the present fiscal year amounted to \$15,973,000, being an increase of \$1,500,000 as compared with the same period last year. The expenditure for the same period was \$12,607,000, being a decrease of \$200,000 as compared with the corresponding period last year. This surplus of \$2,366,000 on December 1st is considered a highly satisfactory showing.

Royalty on the Move.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

The Empress Frederick arrived at Buckingham Palace to-day, and during the day she received a deputation of Greeks who expressed pleasure at the betrothal of Princess Sophia, daughter of the Empress, to the Duke of Sparta, Crown Prince of Greece. The Princess Sophia addressed the gathering, expressing a desire to identify herself in every way with the interests of the country of her intended husband.

LATER.—The Empress Frederick visited the throat hospital, and was received by Drs. Mackenzie and Novill.

The Annexation Movement.

MONTREAL, Dec. 7.

A good deal of excitement was caused to-day by alleged instructions from certain rouge politicians to the promoters of the movement in the States to procure an interview from Cardinal Gibbons and other American prelates favorable to annexation, and also guarantees that the rights of the Canadian church would be left intact were annexation to take place. It is further stated that our annexationists, with such guarantee, would then throw off their mask, and the French Liberals would then adopt the policy of annexation pure and simple.

Disastrous Fire.

NEW YORK, Dec. 7.

The transfer boat Maryland, of the Penn Railroad, one of the largest side-wheel steamers afloat, was burned to the water's edge to-night, with two Pullman cars, two ordinary coaches, and an accommodation car. Twenty-four passengers in the cars were rescued. The loss is heavy.

Earthquake Shock.

RIMOUSKI, Que., Dec. 7.

A heavy earthquake shock was felt here this morning at 9:30. It lasted about half a minute. The shock was also felt at Father Point, Trois Pistoles, St. Flavie and other places along the lower St. Lawrence. No damage was done.

Distress in Ireland.

LONDON, Dec. 7.

It is reported that in many districts of Ireland, in Limerick especially, the distress among the agricultural laborers is enormous. Many are asking to be assisted to emigrate to Buenos Ayres.

Yellow Jack.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 7.

There was a heavy frost this morning and it is the general belief that no more will be heard of Yellow Fever in this city.
