THE ENGLISH ELECTIONS.

Gladstonians Gaining.

Mr. Blake Elected.

Result up to Date

LONDON, July 15  
Professor Sheldon, a well-known friend of Canada, has been defeated in Ramsey. Mr. Coningsby Darsali, a nephew of Lord Beaconsfield, has been elected in Atterton, in Cheshire, the seat formerly occupied by Sir William Canliffe Brooks. The Gladstonians have, up to the present time, won forty seats, which gives them eighty on division. Of the 137 still to be filled, the Conservatives hold 42; the dis-satisfied Liberals hold 15; the Gladstonians hold 48, and the Irish Nationalists hold 31. At 2:10 o'clock yesterday afternoon the returns showed the election of 244 Conservatives; 236 Liberals; 30 Liberal Unionists, 48 Anti-Parnellites; 7 Parnellites, and 3 Laborists. Blake had a walk over in his election, his opponent getting only 347 votes to his 2,554.

FIRE AT ST. PIERRE.—A disastrous fire occurred at St. Pierre, last Thursday, eight dwelling houses and several small shops being burned. Loss about \$20,000. The buildings were situated in the heart of the town and the wind was perfectly calm.

MILITARY.—General Herbert inspected the Lewis camp on Monday, and ordered the immediate discharge of a number of quite young lads and very old men, who were found serving in the ranks and filling up the lists of the battalions.

THE MARKET was well attended this morning with trade fairly brisk. The supply of butter was good at 16 to 18 per lb. Eggs were rather scarce at 10 to 11 cents per dozen. Fowl sold at 50 to 60 cents per pair. Strawberries were in fair supply at 15 to 20 cents per quart. Green peas were for sale the first time this season at 20 cents, and carrots at 5 cents per bunch.

NAUGHTY MAN.—A good many of Hon. Edward Blake's admirers in Canada will be astonished at the news that he has been addressing an election meeting in South Longford on Sunday. Although quite a common thing in Ireland as well as Quebec, Protestants are generally supposed to have conscientious scruples on the subject and Mr. Blake's action will be a surprise to many.

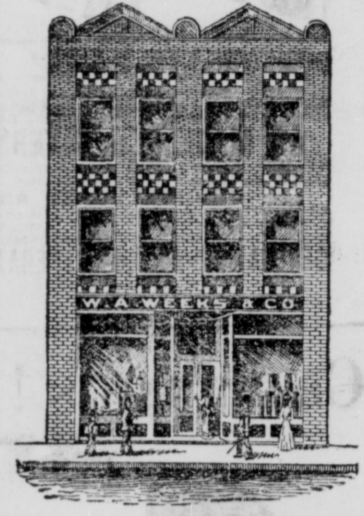

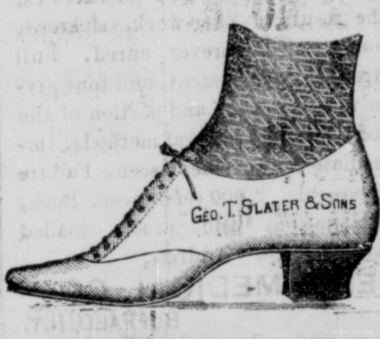
