Vaccination.

It has, says the New York Independent, been over and over again shown, as in the case of armies and with some cities and governments, that no epidemic of smallpox now occurs to those that are vaccinated...

During the winter of 1881-82, when smallpox was epidemic, I allowed fourteen well persons to go to the pest-house in the city of Detroit...

In Brussels, out of more than 10,000 children vaccinated in 1869-70, not one case was reported as having been attacked by the terrible epidemic of smallpox which swept over Europe soon after...

Dr. Henry Tompkins, of the Manchester Royal Infirmary, speaks thus:—

"The most striking of all evidence is, perhaps, that derived from the smallpox hospitals themselves. Here the protective influence of vaccination is seen and proved in a manner beyond all cavil..."

In a severe epidemic of smallpox, which swept over the island of Haiti in 1831-32, Dr. Terres says that, although attending two or three hundred severe cases every day, neither he nor any of his family or servants took the disease...
