We regret to learn that John P. Irving, Chief Clerk of the Customs in this city, is confined to his residence by illness.

We greatly regret to learn that W. C. Bourke, Esq., is so ill that his recovery is not expected.

The city of Kingston has declined to give a bonus of five thousand dollars to a company who are erecting a cotton mill in that city.

A woman named Deborah Plummer, committed suicide by cutting her throat, at the Asylum for the Insane, Halifax, a few days ago.

Col. W. W. Hollister, of Santa Barbara, used to be in the sheep business, but is now nearly out of it, having only 50,000 left, a "remnant" of his once wonderful bands.

FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS in wages lost and four or five hundred thrown out of work—that is all the Montreal "shoremen" have to show as the result of their three weeks' strike.

THE CALIFORNIA WHEAT CROP.—The California wheat yield for 1881 is estimated to be 1,100,000 tons, add to this 500,000 tons, which was last year's surplus, and there will be a grand total of 1,600,000 tons of wheat East.

The report that the Tea stolen from Mr. McGowan's warehouse was found at Grandis is incorrect. No part of it has yet been recovered. The police have gone to North River, to search some houses in that locality.

ST. JOSEPH'S ORPHANAGE, Halifax, was destroyed by fire on Saturday last. During the progress of the fire a firewarden named Connolly received injuries from a falling chimney, which resulted in his death in about twenty minutes.

THE PASSION FOR POWDER.—Yesterday a thoughtful clerk sold a small boy a half pound of powder. It will be reassuring to know that though he might be scolded, the boy still lives. As for the clerk, he is now, we believe, pondering over those awful words, "didn't think."

HEALY'S HIBERNIAN MINSTRELS will arrive in this city to-morrow evening, and commence their short season on Thursday evening. The performance of this troupe is highly praised by the press of St. John and Halifax, and we have no doubt that they will be well received in this city.

DESTRUCTIVE GALE AT LABRADOR.—St. John's N. F., July 15.—Advice just received from Labrador state that heavy gales on the second and third brought immense quantities of ice on the coast in the neighborhood of Grady, destroying much property. Thirty-seven vessels at the latter place are doing nothing—no fish there.

S., on Friday morning next at half-past three, returning she will arrive here at about noon, will leave on second trip at half-past three in the afternoon, and return to Charlottetown, at about 11 p. m. The fast sailing schooner Cetelean which arrived from St. John's, Nfld., on Saturday last, will sail again for that port on the 25th. This schooner has good passenger accommodation, and parties wishing a cheap prospecting tour to Newfoundland, would do well to arrange with Captain English. Rev. Mr. Pasco, wife and family, were passengers to this City by the Cetelean.

THE DOG ACT.—The suit of Henry Chohan vs. Ewen McAulay, an action for damage sustained by the plaintiff in the loss of several sheep by dogs owned by the defendant, was tried by Theoph. Des Brisay, Esq., J. P., and James Curtis, Esq., J. P., yesterday. McAulay was ordered to pay damages amounting to \$25 for four sheep killed and one badly injured. The latter was handed over to the defendant.

TEMPERANCE CONVENTION.—The Convention met this morning in Full's Hall. The meeting was constituted by appointing John Jary, Esq., chairman, and Mr. J. J. Chapman secretary. Rev. Theo. Gales, corresponding secretary, in a very eloquent address, went fully into the object and work of the Alliance, after which it was resolved, on motion of Rev. W. E. Frame, seconded by Wm. Laird, Esq., that the time has come when a branch of the Dominion Alliance should be formed for P. E. Island. Several committees were then appointed when the Convention adjourned to meet again at 2.30 P. m.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND AFRICA.

LONDON, July 16.

Patrick Egan returned to Paris after consulting with the executive of the Land League on the subject of the allocation of the funds during the existing crisis for evicted families.

The question proposed by Henry Labouchere containing very direct charges of despotism and preface against the Prince of Bulgaria, was not permitted to be put in the Commons yesterday.

Thos Bayley Potter, member of Parliament, has forwarded to Garfield from the Cobden Club, a letter expressing their abhorrence at the attempt upon the President's life, an earnest wish for his speedy recovery, and assurance of deep sympathy with his family and the American people.

The Daily News' Paris correspondent had an interview with Barthelmy St. Hilaire, who emphatically denied that France aimed at conquering Tripoli, or retaining Tunisia. He said when the Bey's Government is reorganized the French would quit Tunis. Italy, he said, was satisfied in regard to the intention of France. The Times' correspondent says the Arabs continue to march towards Sfax.

CAPE TOWN, July 16.

Krell, the paramount chief of the Galeks, who has long defied the attempts to capture him, has surrendered with all his people.

PARIS, July 17.

The minister of marine has a despatch from Sfax announcing that the French squadron had arrived in that harbor on Thursday, bombarded the town on Friday, attacked it on Saturday in front and occupied it in spite of vigorous resistance. The French losses were eight killed and forty wounded.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, July 16.

Lorillard to-day shipped nine thoroughbred horses to his English stables at Newmarket.

ROCHESTER, July 16.

Dr. Lewis Swift, Director of the Warner Observatory, yesterday, received a letter from J. M. Schaberio, Ann Arbor, Mich., announcing he had discovered nebulous matter in R. A. 5h. 48m. declination N 38° 45m., but daylight obscured its identity.

Dr. Swift, at 8 this morning, reported he discovered the matter in constellation Auraga. It is quite bright, being larger and more luminous than the one discovered May 1st by Swift. Its centre is strongly condensed, and from its motion apparently is very slow. It cannot be ascertained if it is going directly towards or from the earth. The comet is telescopic. Swift thinks from the present position of the comet that it is the expected comet of 1812, moving very slowly towards the northwest. Schaberio puts in a claim for the \$200 Warner prize.

WASHINGTON, July 17.

Official bulletin, Executive Mansion, 7 p. m.—Our expectations of favorable progress have been fully realized by the manner in which the President has passed the day. He has taken more solid food and with greater relish than hitherto, and this afternoon the fever, which is as slight as that of yesterday, came on later. At 1 p. m. his pulse was 94; temperature 98.5; respiration 18. At present his pulse is 98; temperature 102.2; respiration 20. Signed as usual.

BOSTON, July 17.

The Andover Bridge at Lawrence, Mass., was destroyed to-day. Loss \$30,000.

PARIS, July 18.

A decree ordering the expulsion from France of Don Carlos, Spanish Pretender, was signed on Saturday and communicated to him on Sunday. It is stated that he has been engaged in proceedings which are regarded as a manifestation against the present form of Government in France.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 17.

The weather to-day was the coolest in the last sixteen days. In seven days, from July 10th to 16th inclusive, the deaths from sunstroke were 264, and from excessive heat 150, making 414 deaths. On July 14th the deaths from these causes numbered 86.

TORONTO, July 19—10 a. m.

Moderate winds, mostly southwesterly to northwesterly; fair weather, possibly light showers in some localities.

The live stock exports from Ireland to Great Britain have been on an unusually extensive scale during the past month; the number of animals of all kinds reaching about 100,000 in that time. Most of these were horned cattle, but there was also a considerable proportion of sheep and horses. The cattle were almost entirely made up of stores and fat beasts in almost equal proportions. The animals were shipped at eighteen ports, but the great bulk of them came from Dublin, Belfast, Cork, Waterford and Derry.
