One of Western Canada's biggest coal buyers gave up his commission recently, when H. H. Enman, general fuel agent here for Canadian Pacific's prairie and Pacific regions since 1909, retired on pension after more than 40 years with the company. In 11 years he bought 22,000,000 tons of western coal.

Born in Vernon, Prince Edward Island, he has been a resident of St. Boniface, Man., for 26 years and a former member of the board of stewards of Norwood United Church. Mr. Enman will continue to live in St. Boniface in retirement. Two sons Roy and Norman, reside in Norwood, and a daughter, Mrs. L. Rodway, lives in Winnipeg.

An expert on combustion problems as well as a purchasing man, he has served on loan from the company as consultant on heating needs to University of Manitoba, Winnipeg General Hospital, Winnipeg Sanatorium and to industry, including Manitoba Bridge, Ogilvie Flour and Canada Packers. A survey of all heating plants east of the lakehead was among special work he did for the company.

C. P. R. associates wished him well at a presentation in the office of D. S. Thomson, vice-president of the prairie region. He and Mrs. Enman were also guests of honor at a departmental party which B. W. Roberts, vice-president of purchases and stores attended from Montreal.
