

# Lucille Wheeler Cops Race

## Defeats Austrian Skier By .14 Of A Point In Ratings

KITZBUHEL, Austria (AP) — Canada's pretty, freckled Lucy Wheeler today won the 18th international Hahnenkamm ski race for women by placing seventh in the slalom after winning the downhill Saturday.

Official tabulations gave the 22-year-old St. Jovite, Que., skier first place in the combined ratings by only .14 of a point over Lotte Blattl of Austria.

Miss Wheeler had a total time of 1:46.3 in the slalom which was staggered out with 44 gates over a drop of 160 metres. Putzi Frandl of Austria won it in 1:43.1.

The Canadian girl won the downhill in 2:42.6.

In the combined rating, Miss Wheeler received 1.85 and Miss Blattl 1.99. Miss Frandl had 2.02.

The small Canadian group here was jubilant over Miss Wheeler's victory.

"That was my first start this season and I am very happy," she said. "It was also my first victory."

"I must improve in the slalom, though I liked the course, although the snow was all but gone at several gates on the second run."

Lucy now goes to Bad Gastein, Austria, for an international downhill on Wednesday and then to the international FIS ski week in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, West Germany.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens trounced New York Rangers 5-0 Saturday night. Maurice (Rocket) Richard scoring two goals and goalie Jacques Plante registering his seventh shutout of the season.

Richard's goals, both unassisted were his 17th and 18th. Other Montreal scorers were Andre Pronovost, Don Marshall and Dickie Moore. Andy Hebert was the pick of the Rangers' forwards.

The win was Canadiens' seventh in a row, in an undefeated string of 10 games.

The outclassed Rangers had only 16 shots on goal compared with Montreal's 36. The crowd of 64,042 saw Rangers fall miserably to shake a voodoo that has harassed them on Montreal ice.

Their last win here in regular scheduled play was Jan. 30, 1954. The string has now reached 21 games.
