M. LABOUCHERE states that "it is a fact" that Lord Beaconsfield has three times tendered his resignation to the Queen within six months, and her Majesty has each time begged him to reconsider his request to be relieved of his duties.

ANOTHER ENTERPRISE STARTED IN MONTREAL.—Messrs. Stein & Brise, a New York firm, have established a factory at Montreal, for the manufacture of chopped meat. They say that beef and other meats are about one half cent per pound cheaper here than in New York, and that they can manufacture for Hamburg and other European markets to better advantage.

A WOMAN WHO OBJECTED TO TOBACCO SMOKE.—Mrs. L. Ferguson entered the smoking car on the Third Avenue road, New York, the other day, and after protesting against the cigar smoke, she called upon all the smokers to desist. A general lynch resulted in an assault by the lady on John Henriques. She cuffed him with her muff, and was arrested and taken to the Tombs.

BISMARCK PROPOSES DISARMAMENT.—Cablegrams to the "Mail" report Bismarck in a letter to Senator Jacina, as saying that an agreement of the powers devoted strictly to Conservative and Pacific policy can alone bring about a partial disarmament, which he believes is the only remedy for prevailing depression in finances and miseries of people in various countries.

MILITIA.—Regulations and orders for the militia for 1879 are published in the Canada Gazette. Lieut.-Col. Hewitt, Royal Military College; Lieut.-Col. Irwin, Inspector of Artillery; and Lieut.-Col. Lewis, Assistant Inspector of Artillery, appointed to examine the essays in connection with the Dominion Artillery Association, have decided that none of them have come up to a sufficiently high standard of merit to warrant their publication.

THE Montreal Gazette says: The rumors which have been current for some days of probable changes in the Cabinet at Ottawa, are, we have reason to believe, without the slightest foundation in fact. The Hon. Mr. Blanchet has gone to Ottawa in connection with his duties as Speaker of the House of Commons, and not with reference, as was stated, to political changes. The Hon. Mr. Masson, we are glad to know, is very much better, and we are sure all his friends will heartily join us in the wish that he may long be spared to fulfill the duties of the important office which he holds.

THE SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.—The Toronto Mail of Monday has a severe article on the Supreme Court of the Dominion; pointing out that since its establishment it has cost close on to \$190,000. The Mail says that the Court has not fulfilled the purposes for which it was created; that it has not hastened the processes of the law in its last resort; that it has rather increased than diminished the expenses of appellant's litigation; that in fact it is easier and cheaper to take an appeal to London than to Ottawa.—Two judgments were delivered during the recent session of the Court.

A CABLE DESPATCH of the latest date says: Gladstone's Scotch tour continues to occupy attention almost exclusively. His speeches at Glasgow conclude his public appearances. It is the universal admission that never did an English statesman evoke equal enthusiasm. Advanced Liberals everywhere adhere cordially to Gladstone's programme. The general conclusion of the whole party is that Gladstone's future leadership is essential to Liberal success. Financial authorities pronounced his speech on finances destructive of confidence in the Government. An equally high social authority says this tour has been a revelation to London society, and carries consternation among the classes that hitherto believed Gladstone's popularity had decayed.

A REMARKABLE story of the recovery of stolen property through the influence of "mediums" is reported from Digby, N. S. In August last, while Capt. Musells was walking in the hold of the schooner "Eva," lying at Clements port, some one in the open day went into the cabin and stole his gold watch and chain, valued at \$200. No one was in the vicinity but two small boys, on whom suspicion fastened. They protested their innocence, and stated that while they were fishing they saw two men board the schooner, stay a few moments, then walk towards Digby. Pursuit was made and the men arrested, but no watch was found on them, and as there was no evidence to detain them in custody, they were discharged. Meantime, Captain Musells went to Boston, and consulted a "medium," who told that the watch would be returned. Shortly afterwards the captain received a letter from Bridgewater, stating that the property could be secured. Proceeding there, he visited a man named Dominic Hayes, who was found wearing a gold chain and pin, and gave the name of the person who had the watch. Both of the articles were recovered, and now Captain Musells is a firm believer in spiritualism.

CANADIAN.

QUEBEC, Dec. 9.
Sir Leonard Tilley arrived here last night in company with Hon. J. A. Chapleau and Mr. A. P. Caron; M. P. He will stay with Mr. Caron during his visit here. He is visiting the principal manufactories of the city to-day.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.
Exports of leading commodities for the three months ending October 1st, show that while there was a decrease in value in many of the articles the quantity increased.

ST. LOUIS, Me., Dec. 8.
An immense meeting was held to-night to devise means to aid the suffering peasantry in Ireland. Citizens of all nationalities attended. Subscriptions were collected and resolutions adopted in favor of Home Rule, peasant proprietary, and denouncing the English Government for its failure to correct the evils of the present land system. The meeting continued until a late hour, and much interest and sympathy was manifested.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.
In the House of Representatives to-day a bill was introduced declaring that after the 1st of January next, nothing but gold and silver coin of the United States shall be legal tender in payment of debts thereafter contracted, unless otherwise expressly stipulated.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 9.
The most important subject that came before the House this afternoon was the Uto Indian question. Secretary Schurz submitted a telegram from General Hatch containing a proposition from Ouray to surrender the Indians involved in the White River massacre upon the conditions that they be tried in Washington, and asked what reply would be made. After considerable discussion it was decided that Patch be instructed to receive the guilty Utes, upon the understanding that they would be given a fair trial by a military commission inside of the line of Colorado and New Mexico.

IRISH AFFAIRS.

CASTLEBAR, Dec. 9.
After evidence of the short-hand writers and the police were concluded, Brennan was committed for trial, and bail was accepted for his appearance to answer. After his release Brennan addressed the crowd from the window of his house. He announced that whatever he had said at Balla he was prepared to say again. His words were loudly cheered.

LONDON, Dec. 9.

The land agitation has received a severe blow in the County of Mayo, by the unconditional surrender of a large body of tenants who hold the farms of Sir Roger Palmer. They had demanded 25 per cent reduction, but submitted when served with legal processes. Rents are now rapidly coming in.

RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 9.
A full meeting of the Imperial Council was held yesterday to examine into the internal situation of Russia and determine upon a policy to be adopted. It is believed the decision will be of momentous importance for Russia and the whole of Europe. The report of the re-appointment of Gen. Ignatieff as Russian Ambassador to Rome is unfounded.

Close to the Odessa Railway Station three mines filled with powder and nitro-glycerine have been discovered.

BERLIN, Dec. 9.

It is regarded in Russian circles here that the condition of the Czarina has been greatly improved.

AFGHANISTAN.

CABUL, Dec. 9.
An influential native agent collecting supplies at Maidan, has been murdered. That part of the county is much disturbed. It is reported the rebels are collecting in force there. Two brigades will march upon Maidan immediately, under Generals Baker and McPherson.
An imposing parade of all the troops here, numbering 5,000, was held to-day on the plain near their cantonment. The display made an evident impression on the numerous Afghan spectators, including all the Sidars of note now here.

MADRID, Dec. 6.
A new ministry has finally been constituted as follows:—

BOSTON, Dec. 9.
At the Municipal election to-day Mayor, Prince was re-elected by over twenty-seven hundred majority. The women vote for school committee was as full as their register allowed. The ladies were treated with great courtesy at the polls. The election was one of the most quiet ever held.
