Other domestic sorts are having a moderate sale. Changeovers offering freely at 63 to 65c. Good to choice Scotch magnus quotable at about \$2.00 to \$2.15 per sack.

**EGGS**—No material change this week. There is a good supply offering, but only a small proportion are strictly choice fresh laid. Prices are ruling about the same. The general range for fresh stock is from 26 to 28 cents with now and then a small lot of fancy eastern or Michigan a little higher. Held stock in full supply and good marks in steady demand. Lined selling fairly, choice marks at 20c.
